Equipment Ordered

This first purchase of equipment for the new line includes thirteen flat cars and a dozen box cars and a couple of coaches were negotiated for to be shipped later when the road has reached a stage that the coaches will be needed. A ful equipment of surveyors' instruments was also purchased for the engineering and construction departments, it being the intent of the builders to have every department fully supplied with every instrument necessary to the greatest efficiency. These instruments have already been shipped from Portland.

NAPTHA EXPLOSION ENDANGERS LIVES MANY WORKERS

MALDEN, Mass., July 26. Scores of employes of the New England Dyeing and Cleaning company narrowly escaped death here today when two hundred gallons of napiha exploded, starting a fire which communicated to eight other buildings. Early reports to the police said twenty-one employes were missing but later all were located.

The erroneous reports of loss of life originated from a statement by fireman who declared he saw several persons jump from a building These escaped unburt. Scores of windows were shattered by the force of the explosion and buildings a block way were fired.

The cause of the explosion is not mown. The damage is roughly estiated at \$40,000.
