BILL CARRIGAN, NEW MANAGER OF BOSTON RED SOX, AND JAKE STAHL, JUST DEPOSED BY McLEER

Bill Carrigan, one of the ablest catchers in the American League has become the manager of the Boston Red Sox, pennant winners in the American League and victors in the world's championship contest last year, in place of Jake Stahl. Jimmy McLeer, president of the club, released Stahl the other day when the club was in Chicago for a series with the White Sox.

Carrigan has a reputation around the American League circuit as one of the leading baseball strategists among active players. In the fight for the American League championship last season Carrigan, with Captain Wagner and Manager Stahl, formed a "board of strategy," which directed the team's tactics.

The new manager is twenty-nine years old, and a native of Lewiston, Me. He went to Boston from Holy Cross College in 1906, and has been with the Red Sox ever since, except for part of the season of 1907, when he played with Toronto.

WILSON CONFERS WITH PRESIDENT ABOUT MEXICO

WASHINGTON, July 28.—President Wilson and Ambassador to Mexico Henry Lane Wilson conferred for an hour today on the Mexican situation. At the end of their conference Ambassador Wilson said: "The conference was devoted to presenting the president with the exact facts. I did not discuss any policy. I gave the president my views and he will decide as he pleases."

Ambassador Wilson said he expected to see the president again before he leaves Washington.

After Ambassador Wilson had left, Secretary Bryan conferred briefly with the president.

GOLDEN DRIFT CASE AIRED AGAIN

The celebrated Golden Drift Mining company case is again being heard before Judge Calkins at Jacksonville. The case involves the Amherst dam and its proposed irrigation system for some years in the hands of a receiver, and the Chicago-Rogue River company, formed from stockholders of the Golden Drift company to take over the property, which also is in the hands of a receiver, and the Rogue River Public Service Corporation recently formed to acquire the property by compromise with the creditors of the other concerns. Pending the completion of the latter deal, the court is proceeding with case, originally brought by minor stockholders who alleged fraud and mismanagement, and accused the Amments of operating a get-rich-quick swindle.

LODGE TARRED IN LOBBY PROBE BY MULHALL

Alleged Political Activities of Manufacturers Detailed by Lobbyist Who Has Recovered From Break-down—Cross Examination Starts Soon.

Carter of Montana, Dick of Ohio and Lodge of Massachusetts Implicated in Confessions.

WASHINGTON, July 28.—The alleged political activities of the National Association of Manufacturers in 1911, were reported to the senate lobby committee here today by Martin M. Mulhall of Baltimore who apparently had fully recovered from his breakdown of last Friday. He was expected to conclude his direct examination late this afternoon and attorneys for the N. A. M. are expected to start his cross-examination tomorrow through written questions.

In January, 1911, Mulhall said, he wrote General Manager Bird of the Manufacturers' organization that he had conferred with two senators, and felt sure Attorney Emery could name the chairman of the house labor committee and also control the Judiciary committee. Under close questioning, Mulhall admitted his letter was too optimistic. He said the letter referred to Senators Carter of Montana and Dick of Ohio.

Mulhall said he conferred with Senator Lodge in the latter's office in 1910. Later, he said, he went to Massachusetts and helped in the republican fight there. Lodge denied Mulhall's allegations, declaring that Mulhall might have been in his office but that he held no conference with him.

BURNED BRIDGE DELAYS TRAINS

The burning of a bridge at Ladora, near Oakland Sunday evening has delayed all south bound trains on the Southern Pacific. The Shasta Limited, as well as 13 and 15 are held up and will not arrive till Monday evening or later.
