TARIFF ANGLES GROW WHEN BULL MOOSE LEADERS FIGHT

WASHINGTON, July 29.—Division of republican ranks over the revision of the tariff became apparent today when nearly a dozen progressive republican senators began a series of conferences to perfect substitute schedules that will be offered to the tariff bill under the leadership of La Follette and Cummings.

The progressive republican move grew out of the belief of the leading senators identified with that faction that they would be unable to support Senator Smoot's substitute for the wool schedule. The Smoot substitute was prepared some time ago and was introduced when the democratic bill came back from the finance committee.

The progressive republicans practically have agreed to center their fight about the La Follette substitute in the hope they can carry the remaining republicans and some democrats. Progress on the tariff bill was slow today.

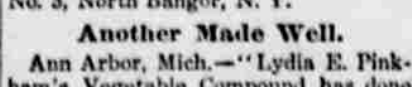
