Representatives Henry, Bulkeley and Ragsdale, members of that committee, all sought Bryan's support.

Bryan told all his interviewers that he indorses the principal features of the Glass-Owen bill; that he refuses to dip into any factional fights, but that he was willing to try to effect some agreement. He then asked the different factions to try to get together in the interest of harmony.

### METHODISTS REPORT GROWTH OF YEAR

The fourth quarterly conference of the Methodist Episcopal church was held Monday night, when the work of the entire year was reviewed and plans for the future of the church entered into.

The district superintendent, Rev. R. E. Dunlap, was present and had charge of the meeting. Reports from the various departments of the church showed progress and growth on all lines. The financial secretary, Mrs. Wines, reported that all financial obligations would be met by the time of the annual conference in September.

The pastor of the church, Rev. E. O. Eldridge, with his usual optimism reported the general and spiritual condition of the church as most satisfactory and encouraging, over 100 new members having been added to the church during the present year.

After the business of the meeting the following resolution was unanimously passed:

"Whereas, the close of the conference year has come, and appreciating the valuable services of our pastor and the splendid success that

has attended his ministry during the two years of his pastorate with us, and believing that the continuation of his ministry for another year is essential to the success and development of our church, therefore, be it Resolved, that we, the members of this quarterly conference, do hereby extend to him a most cordial invitation to continue with us another year; and further, that we request our district superintendent to co-operate with us to this end, and to communicate the same to the presiding bishop at the coming session of the conference to be held in Eugene in September."

Enthusiastic applause greeted the passing of these resolutions, showing the esteem in which the pastor is held by his people.

Resolutions of appreciation of Rev. R. E. Dunlap, the retiring district superintendent, were also passed. Rev. Dunlap will again enter the regular pastorate of the church, having served his full term as superintendent, and a new superintendent will be appointed to the district.
