

WILSON FIRM IN REFUSAL TO IGNORE HUERTA

Serious Friction Between President and Bryan on One Side and Senate Foreign Relations Committee on the Other Over Recognition.

Entire Mexican Situation Likely to Be Aired on Floor of Senate Unless Wilson Changes Attitude.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—Serious friction between President Wilson and Secretary of State Bryan on one side and the senate foreign relations committee on the other exists today over the Mexican situation as a result of Ambassador Henry Lane Wilson's plea to the latter for recognition of the Huerta government.

BOTH BRITAIN AND GERMANY BOYCOTT FAIR

Neither Nation Will Participate in Panama-Pacific Exposition—Panama Canal Tolls Said to Be Cause Though This Is Denied by Bryan.

Excuse Is That International Expositions Are so Frequent as to Lose any Trade Value They May Have.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—Strong indication that neither Germany nor Great Britain will participate in the 1915 Panama Pacific exposition at San Francisco was admitted here today at the state department, where intimations to that effect have been received.

Conductors and Trainmen Vote Overwhelmingly to Strike by Vote of 3629 for to 187 Against.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 31.—Action on the threatened strike of trainmen and conductors on the Pacific division of the Southern Pacific railroad, involving more than 2800 men, will be delayed until an answer is received from the railroad's appeal to the new United States board of mediation and conciliation. A reply is expected before Saturday.
