ESPEE STRIKE HALTS PENDING ROAD'S APPEAL

Action on Threatened Walkout Delayed by Application of Southern Pacific to National Board of Mediation-Rely Expected Saturday

Conductors and Trainmen Vote Over whelmingly to Strike by Vote of 3629 for to 187 Against.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 31. Action on the threatened strike of trainmen and conductors on the Pacific division of the Southern Pacific railroad, involving more than 3800 men, will be delayed until an answer is received from the railroad's appeal to the new United States board of mediation and conciliation. A reply is expected before Saturday.

The conductors and trainmen voted overwhelmingly to strike, a canvass of the vote showing 3629 favored a walkout, while only 187 that an exchange of rights with main line trainmen be given those employed on the Oakland, Alameda and Berkeley lines and the lines in Oremain line trainmen in regard to senlority and working conditions.
