BACK TO INDIA IS MOVE OF HINDUS

CHICO, Cal., Aug. 1.—Declaration that Hindus on the Pacific coast have started a movement "back to India" which in the next five years will leave comparatively few of their countrymen in the west, was voiced here today by Bough Singh, a Hindu leader. "We don't seem to be wanted," he said, "and new fields of immigration will be sought in other countries."
