GRADING RAILROAD TO CRESCENT CITY

(Grants Pass Courier.)

Great progress is being made on the railroad grade west of town, and it will be ready for the ties and rails by Saturday night as far as Allen creek. Engineer Harmon computed the cost of moving the dirt per yard up to Thursday night, and finds that thus far it has been but 17 cents, a very low figure as compared with the usual contract job. The ground has been in excellent condition for handling, the rains of last week having softened it, and there being no rocks to interfere with operations. The soil thus far has been a mixture of red and granite. Only slip scrapers have been employed thus far, the haul having been very short, but wheel scrapers are being made ready to put on the job. The teams and men are scattered along in gangs for a distance of about a half mile, the "finishing" crew coming last and leaving the grade ready for the tracklayers.

The right-of-way as far as the Applegate river is all cleared of brush and stumps and the graders will progress rapidly to that point, the only material cut being on Jerome prairie. The number of teams will be increased next week, and a camp will soon have to be established as the distance from town will be too great for the men to go back and forth to the work. At present enough local teams and men are available for the job, and with the closing of commercial fishing on the Rogue the teams that have been employed in handling the boats back up the river will be free for the graders.

LAST SPRAY FOR COBBLING MOTH

The last spray for cobbling moth should be applied some time during next week. The moths from the first brood larvae have been emerging during the last few days, so that we should expect to see second brood larvae enter the fruit during the latter part of next week. Eggs are being laid now and will hatch in a week or ten days.

Whether or not one should spray will depend upon the number of infested fruit found during the thinning process. If no worms are found, or only a very few, then spraying will not be necessary; however, if a considerable number of worms are found, then spraying should not be neglected. Every orchardist should be able, during the thinning process, to determine the effectiveness of the first and second applications of arsenate of lead, and should, therefore, be his own judge as to the necessity for another spray.

It must be remembered that each female moth is capable of producing at least fifty young, and each larva may mean an infested fruit. The last spray should be the usual formula of four pounds of arsenate of lead to one hundred gallons of water. Only moderate pressure should be used, but sufficient to cover the fruit with a fine mist. Apples only should be sprayed.

GOOD FRUIT PRICES IN PROSPECT.

THE owner of a four acre pear orchard, who has been importing realty dealers for the past year to sell his orchard at \$500 an acre, this week took the place off the market. He had sold his crop, before it was picked, for a price approximating \$1900, receiving \$1.25 a box for the fruit, run of orchard, delivered unpacked in the picking boxes, at the packing house.

There is every indication that orchardists will secure fine prices for fruit this season. There is a shortage throughout the country. The year promises to be a prosperous one for the northwest fruit men.

Because last season's fruit brought comparatively low prices and the yield was short the year before, many growers became blue and talked of over production. Yet the same experience has repeated itself over and over again.

Several times in past years many orchards hereabouts were pulled up, because the owners were convinced that "over production" had ruined the market. Others sold at a sacrifice, and the purchasers sold the first crop for enough to pay for the property.

It is the history of the fruit industry. Like every business, it has its fat and lean years. But the profits in fat years are greater than in almost any other business.

Every fruit grower should make his property support him, outside of the orchard. This he can do by raising other products, by general farming. Then if a failure of crops comes, he is in position to stand the loss.

There will never be an over production of fancy fruit, and fruit, like other products of the soil, will increase in average volume as population becomes denser and land scarcer. But the wise fruit grower will not put all his eggs in one basket, especially if his capital is limited.

DAIRYING A NEGLECTED RESOURCE.

THERE are many thousands of acres of land idle hereabouts which could be utilized profitably not only for berries, vegetables and fruit, but for dairying purposes.

No country in the world is better adapted to dairying. In none are cattle freer from disease. Almost every farmer and orchardist could profitably add a few cattle, yet here we are importing nearly all the butter we use and not a co-operative creamery in the valley.

There are thousands of acres of idle land that could be used for range, already fenced, that do not pasture an animal, and the owners or renters are buying their butter.

The day of the big ranges is gone forever. Beef and other meats are therefore constantly raising in price, insuring a good profit for the stock grower. The cattle supply of the future must come from the small farmers, who turn off a few head a year each.

With large tracts in alfalfa, and few alfalfa growers feeding their own cattle, with an abundance of water and idle land which together should support a large quantity of livestock, with a home market made to order, dairying can be classified as one of our most neglected resources.

Diaz further declared that he had made no final plans regarding his departure, but may leave tonight.

General Luis Torres, former governor of Sonora, with whom it was expected Diaz would confer while in Los Angeles, is today at Bandana, Cal. Members of the Diaz party deny that Diaz met Torres here, or that there is likely to be a conference between the men.

PREPARE NOW FOR COVER CROPS

Those who wish to grow cover crops should remember that the best time to put in such crops is during the latter part of August. We have found that winter oats and vetch make the best combination for this district. The seed should be drilled in at the rate of 20 pounds of oats to 70 pounds of vetch seed per acre. To get the best results, the vetch seed should be inoculated with nodule-forming bacteria. Tested pure cultures may be had for the asking by addressing a request to the U. S. department of agriculture, Washington, D. C., stating the quantity (in pounds) of vetch seed it is desired to inoculate. Remember that oats cannot be inoculated, as only leguminous plants are capable of bearing bacterial nodules. P. J. O'GARA, Pathologist in Charge.

JACKSON COUNTY GETS \$13,507 SCHOOL FUNDS

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 2.—Compared with the total of last year's appropriation of the interest of the irremediable school fund among the counties of the state, the total of the appropriation, made today for this year by State Treasurer Kay exceeds it by \$8230.14, the total for this year being \$360,711.30, and that for last year \$352,481.16. With an increase, however, of 7001 in the school population during the year, the total population for last year being 189,506 and that for this year 197,110, the apportionment for each pupil has been reduced 3 cents, the per capita apportionment last year being \$1.88 and that for this year \$1.85. The apportionment of the interest of this fund among the counties of the state by the state treasurer on August 1 of each year, the table showing the school population of each county and the apportionment received for Jackson county for 7381 school population is \$13,507.

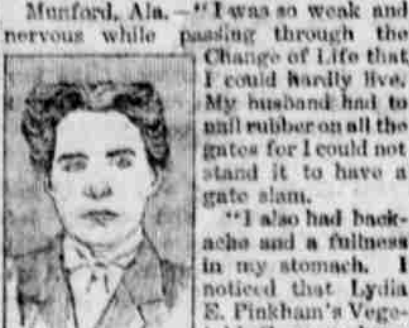

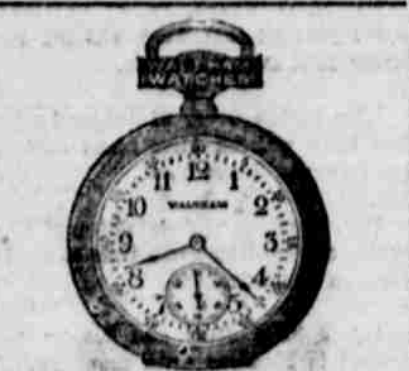
