

DONALD ARRIVES AND BUD DUE HERE TOMORROW

Looking like anything but the manager of a loser, Dick Donald, accompanied by his valet, stepped off No. 16 last night and was greeted cordially by a number of Medford boxing enthusiasts.

Donald gave a graphic description of the Fourth of July fight in which "Kid Appendicitis" and Lench Cross knocked the "Pride of Medford" cold. Donald asserts that the Los Angeles boxing fans regard the Cross-Anderson affair as a "no contest" fight and the promoters are anxious to have Bud start again as soon as his manager thinks he has regained his old-time strength.

Dick contradicted the statements appearing in Portland papers that Cross and his manager got the best of him in the arrangements for the weight and manner of fighting in the clinches. Donald asserted that the men fought straight Marquis of Queensbury rules as has been the rule in all of Bud's former fights. The weight was entirely satisfactory to Bud and all in all the arrangements were as good as Donald could have made had he been given carte blanche in the matter.

Bud will arrive Sunday and will be met by a large crowd of the "Pride's" backers who are unanimous in voicing their confidence that Anderson can beat Cross before the year has passed.

MEXICAN OUTLAW SHOT BY RURALES

EL PASO, Tex., Aug. 2.—A leading El Paso newspaper today prints a telegram from General Villa of Mexico reporting the execution of "El Mocho" Monero, the notorious outlaw, who terrorized American lumber camps in Chihuahua in July, killing Ben Griffin and seriously wounding Alfred Parks. Colonel Juan Medina, a former mayor of Juarez, commanded the firing squad.

KING CHARLES 1. BLAMED FOR LACK OF AIRSHIP LAWS

LONDON, Aug. 2.—The failure of King Charles I. to foresee and legislate for the advent of aeroplanes has enabled some 6000 residents of Hull and district to give the police and the local authorities the horse laugh.

Incidentally scores of police notebooks were wasted in taking the names and addresses of people who could not be prosecuted.

When Aviator Robert Whitehouse announced that he would give flying exhibitions at the local aerodrome on Sundays, the "unco guid" of Hull raised their hands in horror and put up such a squeal that the police notified the aviator and possible spectators that they would be liable to prosecution under the Lord's Day observance act, an ancient statute of Charles I. framed to prevent the irreverent from indulging in cock fighting, bull baiting and kindred sports on the Sabbath.

Whitehouse declared he would fly, prosecution or no prosecution, and some 6000 spectators patronized the aerodrome despite the warnings of the police, who took the names and addresses of all present. On applying for summonses, however, the police were told by the magistrates that flying was neither a sport nor a pastime within the meaning of the law, and that prosecutions must fail. Strict Sabbatharians are wroth with the "martyr king" for overlooking such an obvious form of desecrating the Sabbath, but they realize that there is no chance of amending the law now.

GERHARD UNABLE TO LEASE EMBASSY

BERLIN, Aug. 2.—Ambassador Gerhard, the new American diplomat accredited to the German court, arrived here today for a preliminary survey of his field of labor. He sought to secure a house to rent, but was unsuccessful, feeling unable to pay the tremendous rentals asked. Ambassador Gerhard will sail for New York next Thursday.

BLUE LEDGE SALE CONFIRMED SAYS RUMOR IN YREKA

YREKA, Aug. 2.—That the deal for the great Blue Ledge copper mines, on the upper Applegate river, has been practically consummated is confirmed by private advices from Blue Ledge camp. The coterie of Michigan people who have been examining the mines for several weeks has decided to take them over. It is stated that the first payment will be made at an early date.

Under the ownership of Robert S. Towne and associates of New York, over two miles of underground developments have been accomplished, and an enormous tonnage of high quality ore exposed. It is stated that the gold and silver values disclosed are nearly sufficient to defray operating costs.

The great handicap under which the Blue Ledge district has always labored has been the absence of adequate transportation facilities. To remedy this, it is proposed to build a railroad from the field to Medford or some other Oregon town, to enable the company to ship in supplies and send out matter at nominal costs. There are several other extensively developed properties in the district besides the Blue Ledge group, with much Seattle, Portland and Spokane capital interested. The building of a railroad means that practically all these mines would be operated along broad lines.

BRITISH PUBLIC WANTS EXHIBIT AT FRISCO FAIR

LONDON, Aug. 2.—There is every evidence here today that the British public does not sympathize with the government's tentative decision not to participate in the Panama Pacific exposition at San Francisco in 1915. Business and professional men generally comment unfavorably on the action of the London board of trade, and believe it would be a reflection on the British nation should it not take part in the fair. Many believe that the decision is far from final and that the Union Jack will wave over a great exhibit when the exposition opens its doors to the world.

Most of the newspapers of London today publish editorials of the same general tenor as that of the Pall Mall Gazette, explaining that the Panama tolls controversy has had nothing to do with the decision of the board of trade.

OMAHA, Neb., Aug. 2.—An injunction restraining his mother-in-law, Mrs. Levi A. Gardner, of Harvard, Ill., from visiting his home is granted here today to Leslie A. King, a wealthy wool buyer. King asserts Mrs. Gardner came to his home and refused to leave.

"I could be arrested for what I think every time I see that woman," said King today. "She causes trouble between Mrs. King and myself and is the most meddling person in the world. I offered her \$15 a day to keep away from my home, but she only turned up her nose."
