COOPER UNDER ARREST FOR LIBEL

MARYSVILLE, Cal., Aug. 5.—On a complaint issued out of Justice Morrissey's court at the instance of Everett Barr, of Yuba City, George Cooper, baseball pitcher, formerly of Medford, Oregon, was arrested by Constable Tyrrell on a charge of criminal libel.

Barr's actions are based on newspaper articles which Cooper caused to be printed in the Marysville Democrat and Sacramento Bee, alleging that Barr and Jack Wallace, both of Yuba City, wrecked his home and the home of E. Wilson, a Marysville butcher, by alienating the affections of the Cooper and Wilson women and causing them to flee to Sacramento.

Cooper and Wilson represented that Mrs. Cooper and Mrs. Wilson met Barr and Wilson clandestinely, and by prearrangement and went for a boat ride on Feather river with the Yuba City men, when, it is now claimed, there were in reality a third woman and a boy of 3 years in the party with Mrs. Cooper and Mrs. Wilson.

Barr alleges that Cooper had some ulterior motive in thus misrepresenting him. He charges that Mrs. Cooper was justified in leaving Cooper on account of blows which Cooper administered at the Yuba City boat landing on the return of the boating party.

CROOK AND GREEN ROAD GETS \$2000

SALEM, Or., Aug. 5.—The federal forestry department has apportioned \$19,910, which is 10 per cent of the income from timber sales in national forests, for improving various roads in the national forests in this state. This apportionment is made on the recommendation of Governor West. The apportionment is as follows:

The Prineville-Mitchell wagon road in Crook county, \$1000; Gates-Quartzville road, in Marion county, \$500; Cape Perpetua road, Lincoln county, \$2000; Lehman-Springs road, Umatilla county, \$750; three different roads in the Umpqua forest, in Benton county, \$1700; Grouse creek road, Wallowa county, \$1000; Denolation road, Baker county, \$2000; Paisley-Chewacuan road, from Paisley into the Chewacuan valley, \$750; Murderer's creek-Spruce ranch road, Malheur county, \$1250; Cove-Minam road, Union county, \$900; McKensie road, which is the only road connecting the central part of eastern Oregon with the Willamette valley, \$5000; Cook and Green road, which is a link in the highway between Oregon and California, \$2000; Bend-Sparks Lake road, Crook county, \$1000.

In every instance there is to be co-operation in the building or improving of the roads on the part of the counties or citizens.

MARSH USES WANT AD TO FIND WIFE

The above want ad in Los Angeles papers is occasioned by the disappearance of Lena Marsh, wife of H. M. Marsh, the drayman, who returned from Coos Bay to find a note telling him of the departure of his wife. She stated she had \$20 and would go as far south as she could get on the money. Dependancy over the prospective loss of their team and home is said to be the cause of the woman's becoming unbalanced. The husband also blames gossip for creating trouble by scandal mongering.

OKLAHOMA RANCH SHOW IS COMING

MORE FORESTS FOR UNCLE SAM

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—The first government forest to be acquired upon the watershed of the Ohio river has just been approved for purchase by the national forest reservation commission. This purchase is included in what is known as the Monogahela area, and the commission considers it an important one since the Ohio is one of the most navigable streams of the country.

Last year the Pittsburgh flood commission made a special study of reforestation at its headwaters.

Four areas in all are approved, including the Monogahela, and making up the largest set of purchases passed upon at any one time by the commission. They aggregate 113,599 acres, and bring the total of all the national forests in the east up to 712,415 acres. Of this amount, about 309,000 acres were acquired during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1912, and 400,000 acres during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1913.

D. D. BOYLE RESIGNS CHURCH PASTORATE

D. D. Boyle who has been pastor of the Christian church for about two years, gave his resignation to the church Sunday to take effect September 1. After a short rest Mr. Boyle will take up evangelistic work in which he was formerly engaged. The official board at its regular meeting Monday night accepted the resignation and passed a resolution commending Mr. Boyle for his excellent work for the church here, for his splendid Christian life and wishing him success wherever he goes. During his pastorate the beautiful bungalow church was built and he is entitled to a great deal of the credit for its erection. The church has also made splendid progress, spiritually and financially during his pastorate. He has made many warm friends during his stay here who will regret his departure.

BRITISH ARMING TO AID ULSTERITES

LONDON, Aug. 5.—Anti-Home Rule Unionists in England are quietly organizing re-enforcements on this side of the Irish sea to go to the assistance of the "army of Ulster," which is now being drilled and equipped to resist by force of arms the authority of the Dublin Parliament whenever it shall be created.

In the past six months, since the "British League for the support of Ulster and the Union" was formed, several thousand English Unionists have pledged themselves to respond whenever called.

"We are preparing for the worst," today declared one of the officials of the League. "The Parliamentary situation is hopeless. The time for speaking is past. What we want now is not the men who will speak for us, but who will shoot for us. We have 150 army agents scattered about England who are enrolling men to stand by Ulster, whatever the consequences. Ulster is facing the situation with dauntless courage; so are we English Unionists. In every case, the men enrolled have promised their services without any reservation. Within three months we shall have 10,000 men capable of bearing arms, and well organized, each with his heart and soul in the cause."

BOXING BOUTS FOR WISCONSIN

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Aug. 5.—Wisconsin today takes her place as a "fight state." The new law legalizing boxing under the supervision of three commissioners who are empowered to enforce the new law, goes into effect today. The new law follows closely the provisions of the Frawley law in New York. Heavy penalties are provided for infractions of any section of the law. Some of the provisions of the new statute provide for:

A commission of three members, two to be appointed by the governor, and these two to appoint a "secretary," who will be a member of the commission.

A license fee of \$3000 for all boxing clubs.

Each club must employ a licensed referee.

The building in which the fights take place must be leased for at least one year.

All bouts are limited to ten rounds.

Five ounces is the minimum weight of the gloves used.

All fighters must be at least 18 years of age.

Fighters must be examined by a physician and the referee before all bouts.

In case of accident the physician and referee will be held accountable.
