

FIRST BARTLETT'S OF SEASON LEAVE VALLEY FOR EAST

Influx of summer pears in the east has had the effect of slightly cutting the Bartlett market and it is expected to be off for the next few days. Sales Friday were as follows: Boston, \$2.75; Philadelphia, \$2.60; Chicago, \$2.85; New York, \$2.60. Local summer pears, \$2.50 to \$3.50 per barrel.

Two cars of Bartlett's, the first to leave the valley, one from Foothills and one from the Bingham orchard, were shipped Saturday. Picking of Bartlett's begins extensively Sunday. The Josephine County Growers' association has negotiated the sale of the Bartlett pears grown by its members at \$1.50 per box box. F. O. h. Grants Pass, the sale to include 5000 boxes or whatever the output of the orchards of the association members will be. The sale was made to the Pioneer Fruit company, through Mr. McKeane, its agent, and shipment of the fruit will be made to the south.
