

### ROGUE BARTLETTS DOING STUNTS IN PEAR MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 14.—

Rogues are doing stunts in the pear market, and there is naturally much excitement in the trade from the Atlantic to the Pacific and from the Gulf of Mexico to the Canadian markets.

Rogue river Bartlett pears sold today at \$2.00 a box, f. o. b. Medford the highest price of the season to date. This price was secured for two carloads of the fruit from Oregon's premier pear section—which by the way means the best pear growing district in the world. The sale was confirmed by the Northwestern Fruit Exchange of this city. Shipment will be made to a Canadian city.

#### Don't Overstay Market

Notwithstanding all this excitement in the pear trade of the United States and Canada at this time, there are indications that some of the Pacific northwest sections will not find this good price available for the reason that some shippers are so afraid to sell that they are liable to lead growers to refuse business until after all the strength of the trade has subsided.

Overstaying a good market is one of the characteristics of many produce interests. They invariably hold blindly for a higher price without the slightest conception of what the market is going to do or why it is high or low.

#### Conditions Favorable

Present price for pears is considered unusually favorable especially as they have received a big cash advance on their orders; thus insuring them non-acceptance should the market price go to a low figure after shipment is made.

At the same time that the Northwestern Fruit Exchange confirmed its order for two carloads of Rogue river Bartletts, it likewise accepted an order for one carload of Washington Bartletts at \$1.70, shipment to be made to the same parties. This differential in price is generally considered adequate by the trade owing to the better established reputation of the Rogue river fruit in the markets of the world.

### ENLARGING GROUNDS PENDLETON ROUND-UP

PENDLETON, Or., Aug. 14.—Owing to the unprecedented demand for reserved seats for the Round-Up this year, September 11, 12 and 13, the management has been compelled to add two new sections to the grand stand in addition to the two additional bleacher sections which are going up. If the attendance keeps on the increase another year will see the seating capacity at the limit and then it will be necessary to rebuild part of the bleachers, giving them greater height. The grand stand will probably be double decked and then that will be the positive limit of the seating capacity. While there were 50,000 people in Pendleton last year during the Round Up, the indications are this year the number will reach 75,000. For the accommodation of the crowds circus tents and national guard tents are being secured and everybody will be cared for.

### THIRD INCEST CASE SINCE FIRST OF YEAR

Complaint was filed this morning by Mrs. Vine Odia of Evans creek, against her husband Vine Abraham Lincoln Odia, charging him with failure to support his wife and children. While the county judge and district attorney were investigating the failure to support charge, what promises to be a very ugly case of incest, was uncovered and a warrant was issued for the arrest of the person so charged.

This is the third case of incest to be prosecuted in the district since the first of the year, one in Josephine county where a father was convicted of incest with his daughter, and the case of Ralph Potter bound over to the grand jury on a charge of incest with his sister.

### TEN CALVES BORN IN BUFFALO HERD

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 14.—

The birth of ten calves in the buffalo herd maintained by the government on the Wichita national forest and game refuge, near Lawton,

Okl., has been reported by the game warden in charge. The herd now contains a total of forty-eight head of full-blooded buffalo, or more properly, bison, of which twenty-seven are males and twenty-one females. All of the animals are in splendid condition.

In 1907 the American bison society donated to the federal government a nucleus herd of fifteen animals which had been bred and rear-

ed in the New York zoological park. The animals were transported to the Wichita national forest, which is also a game refuge and placed under the care of the forest service. They readily adapted themselves to their new habitat, but the area upon which they were placed was within the zone affected by the Texas fever tick and during the two or three years following their transfer only the constant care and watchfulness

of the forest officers prevented the complete loss of the herd.

The fact that the herd has not increased more rapidly is due largely to the preponderance of male calves. This characteristic of the buffalo is so pronounced in all of the herds now in captivity that a cow is considered twice as valuable as a bull.
