PIONEERS MEET AT ASHLAND THURSDAY

The annual reunion of the Pioneer Society of Southern Oregon will be held at Ashland on Thursday, August 28, and old settlers and their families from all parts of Jackson county are expected and invited to attend. Arrangements for the reunion are in the hands of committees of native sons and daughters and an interesting program is being arranged.

The Chautauqua tabernacle in the center of Ashland's beautiful central park will be the gathering place for the day, where programs will be held in the forenoon and afternoon. At 10:30 there will be a program of about one hour, including a short address by the president, reading of memorials of deceased members, a bit of unwritten history of southern Oregon and some musical numbers. At noon a banquet will be served in the G. A. R. hall for the pioneers and their families. Admission to this will be by ticket.

At 2 o'clock in the afternoon the address of the day will be given by Irvin E. Vining.

The day is one of especial interest to the old settlers and their families, but the general public is cordially invited to attend the exercises at the chautauqua tabernacle.

IRA J. PHIPPS MEDFORD PIONEER CROSSES DIVIDE

Iradell Judson Phipps, one of the earliest settlers of Jackson county, died at his home, 328 N. Riverside, Medford, on August 22, 1913, at 3:30 p. m. after an illness which dates back several years. He was born in Owen county, Indiana, on March 1, 1828. When a young man he moved with his parents to Unionville, Mo., where on April 21, 1861, he was married to Callista P. Downing.

He crossed the plains in 1862 and located in La Grande, Baker county, Oregon. In 1865 he moved to Jackson county, where the city of Medford now stands, and became one of the founders of this city. He was a man of marked ability and identified himself with all the various interests of the community, and by his gifts and donations aided largely in the development of one of the most beautiful cities in Oregon. Mr. Phipps belonged to that class of sturdy pioneers who, by their ability and indomitable energy, made possible the splendid civilization that we today enjoy in this great northwest country. He was a familiar figure upon the streets of our city until enforced illness in the last few years necessitated his retirement to the quiet of home, where he was most tenderly cared for by the loving hands of wife and children. Several winters were spent by him in his home in Redlands, Cal. in an attempt to recover his failing health.

In early manhood he was converted to a Christian life and became a charter member of the First Methodist Episcopal church of Medford, and for forty-nine years he was actively identified with all the religious interests of our community. He was a devoted husband and loving father and liberally provided for his home and its needs. In the death of Mr. Phipps Medford has lost one of its leading and most influential citizens.

He leaves a large circle of friends and relatives to mourn his loss, among whom are his widow and four children, William J. of Alberta, Canada; D. Edward, Dr. Ira D. and one daughter, May, of Medford. Two

As has been customary for a number of years, friends gathered at the Short farm on Foots creek, where Grandma, as she is fondly called, makes her home with her daughter, Mrs. Ella L. Short, and extended their congratulations.

Two events toward which Grandma always looks with pleasure are the sumptuous dinner and the arrival of the mail carrier. In both instances her fondest desires were fulfilled, for eleven friends gathered around the table and the mail carrier brought her over 150 postcards and letters from all parts of the United States. One of the greatest prized epistles was a postcard of congratulations from Grandma Todd of Eugene, who has reached the age of 103 years and has the distinction of being the oldest person in Oregon.

Grandma Whitney is hale and hearty. She passes her time attending to her plants and flowers and making lace. She does not use glasses and her signature is more firm than those of many people forty years her junior.

Many presents were delivered in person or by mail and as evening shadows darkened Grandma expressed herself as having had one of the happiest days of her life.

ASHLAND MILITIA OFF FOR FT. STEVENS

ASHLAND, Or., Aug. 23.—First Company Coast Artillery Reserves of Oregon left Thursday for Fort Stevens, about fifty strong, officered as follows: Captain G. C. Spencer, first Lieutenant Clyde Dean, Sergeants Willis Bailey, Don Spencer, Oscar Gainard, Peter Spencer and J. Q. Adams, who will also act as quartermaster, Corporals Danford, Butterfield, Tweed and Tate, Musicians Floyd Dickey and Cedric Myers.

They left the armory in service uniform with full camp equipment, and entrained on No. 16.

At Fort Stevens they will be drilled in artillery practice for ten days, under command of Colonel Hammond of Eugene, who with other officers will direct the military movements of the Coast Artillery corps.

NEW RECORD MADE FOR METALLIC MONOPLANES

PARIS, Aug. 23.—A new record for metallic monoplanes was established today by Aviator Guillaux when he flew from Biarritz to Brussels in twelve and a half hours, stopping briefly en route at Versailles.

SEATTLE JUDGE PUTS BAN ON SALE SOCIALIST PAPERS

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 23.—Breaking all precedents here, Judge John E. Humphries of the superior court placed a permanent ban on the sale of socialist papers and literature in a certain prescribed area in the downtown section of the city. This order was made in an addition to a permanent injunction issued on Friday afternoon prohibiting street speaking in that district.

"If you want socialist papers," the judge said from the bench to a big crowd in the courtroom, "get them by mail or from some friend."

The complaint for an injunction, asked by a number of business men who allege that the street meetings so blockaded traffic that their business was injured, didn't attack the socialists as such or make any reference to the sale of socialist papers.

Judge Humphries, during the three days of the hearing frequently made caustic references to the socialist orators and to their attorney, Glenn Hoover, promising to see them speedily sent to the county stockade, "where the weary willies may learn what it is to work."
