The University Club will tender the visiting gentlemen of the party a dinner at the club rooms on the evening of September 5th, while the College Women's Club will entertain the fear ladies of the party at a dinner given at the Hotel Medford.

Parkhurst, mannger, having promised to give special rates and to permit the free use of the launch and boats, with the understanding that the party shall not be more than thirty in number. Accommodations for this number have already been reserved by the committee, so that, others who may wish to go to the lake on the same day will have to make arrangements for themselves,

They will, therefore, know Oregon by what we are able to show them. They have given us ample time to let them see Crater Lake as well as the magnificent orchards of the Rogne river valley,

The countries represented European botanists are England. Scotland, Denmark, Netherlands, Germany and Switzerland, countries which are the birthplaces of the world's greatest scientists in every line of research.
