

# AUTOS WANTED TO TAKE BOTANISTS TO CRATER LAKE

Twenty of the world's most noted botanists will arrive in Medford on the morning of September 3rd, and will be the guests of the commercial club, University Club and College Women's Club. The commercial club through its committee, Professor P. J. O'Gara, C. E. Gates and S. S. Smith, are making arrangements to take the visitors to Crater Lake, starting about 7:00 a. m. September 3rd and returning on the afternoon of September 5th. The University Club will tender the visiting gentlemen of the party a dinner at the club rooms on the evening of September 5th, while the College Women's Club will entertain the four ladies of the party at a dinner given at the Hotel Medford.

While at Crater Lake the botanists, owners or drivers of the automobiles conveying them and the committee in charge will be shown every courtesy by the Crater Lake company, A. L. Parkhurst, manager, having promised to give special rates and to permit the free use of the launch and boats, with the understanding that the party shall not be more than thirty in number. Accommodations for this number have already been reserved by the committee, so that others who may wish to go to the lake on the same day will have to make arrangements for themselves.

### Twelve Europeans

There are twelve European botanists and eight Americans. In having them come to Medford the commercial club considers their visit a great advertisement for the Rogue river valley and Crater Lake. During the course of each college year these scientists will come in contact with fully 100,000 students, and besides will lecture before the various scientific organizations to which they belong. They will also prepare numerous articles for publication in scientific and popular journals. Their influence will be such as to cause many people to look with favor on this section of Oregon. As a matter of fact, Medford is the only point in the state of Oregon at which they will stop; it is their only stop between Tacoma and San Francisco. They will, therefore, know Oregon by what we are able to show them. They have given us ample time to let them see Crater Lake as well as the magnificent orchards of the Rogue river valley.

The countries represented by the European botanists are England, Scotland, Denmark, Netherlands, Germany and Switzerland, countries which are the birthplaces of the world's greatest scientists in every line of research.

### Eight Autos Wanted

The committee would like to have at once the names of eight citizens who will volunteer to make the trip with their machines. Those who furnish machines and accompany them will be taken care of on the trip, and will not be under expense. In this respect the arrangements will be much the same as last year when the geologists were taken to the lake. As the committee wishes to complete all arrangements as soon as possible, it is hoped that those who can go will at once send in their names.

Besides the entertainment furnished by the Crater Lake company, the University Club and the College Women's Club, it will be necessary to provide funds for other necessary expenses, and during the week the committee will make it a point to call on those citizens who have always shown an interest in the welfare of Medford and the valley. Whatever is given should be considered not a donation, but rather the making of an investment in a good advertising "stunt." Let everybody help a little and the burden will not be heavy.

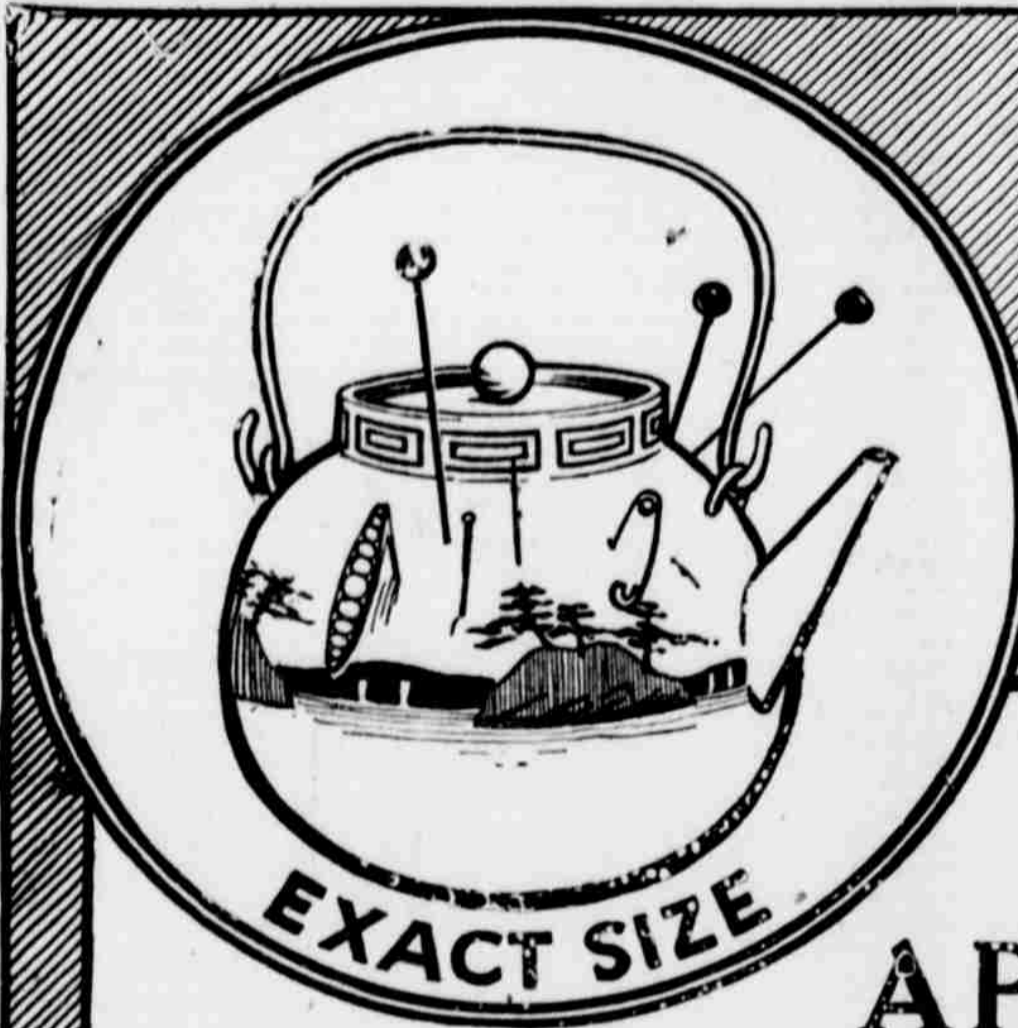
