LET MEXICANS FIGHT IT OUT

The world expected the United States to Mexico's nearest friend.
"Mr. Lind executed his mission with tact, firmness and judgment. He made clear not only his visit's purpose but its spirit but his proposals were rejected in a note, the full text of which I lay before you. I am lead to believe they were rejected partly because the Mexican authorities were grossly misinformed and misled on two points. They did not realize the friendliness of Americans nor the determination that a solution would be found for Mexican difficulties. They did not believe that the administration spoke through Mr. Lind for the masses of the American people. The effect of this misunderstanding leaves them isolated and without friends who are able to effectually aid them.

POWERS' ADVICE REJECTED

"So long as this misunderstanding continues we must await their awakening to the truth. We cannot thrust our good offices on them. The situation must have time to work itself out. I believe only a little while will be necessary and the actual situation of the Mexico City authorities will presently be revealed.
"Several great governments have urged the Mexican provisional authorities to accept our offers.
The president proceeded to explain at length that Lind's instructions emphasized the disinterestedness of the United States, this country's anxiety to preserve Mexican independence and the entire absence of influence by any personal, property or political interest.

HUERTA'S REPLY SET FORTH

The president then set forth that Huerta's reply, through foreign Minister Gamba, said the dictator realized that the American proposals were intended to be friendly, otherwise they would have been immediately rejected on account of their humiliating character. Huerta refused to promise that he would not be a candidate for the presidency, asserted that pacification of the country was proceeding and refused the proposal for an armistice on the ground that he must punish outlaws now in the field.
Gamba's note, the president said, urged American neutrality, recognition of Huerta as president, and denouncing the tension with America, denied that Mexico was responsible therefor. Gamba also recalled the recognition of Huerta by Ambassador Henry Lane Wilson. It concluded thus:
"When the situation reaches a happy conclusion no mention will be made of causes which might carry us, if the present tension persists, to nobody knows what extremities for two peoples under obligation to continue friendly, provided that friendship is based on mutual respect."

APPLAUSE GREETED MESSAGE

Huerta dispatched his latest note to Lind by courier instead of by telegraph and hence the president read his message not knowing its contents. The reading of the message was most impressive. Prolonged applause greeted the president's appearance in the house and his departure therefrom. Otherwise, although the chamber was packed, he was heard in dead silence. Mrs. Wilson and her daughter occupied the executive gallery during the reading of the message which consumed twenty-seven minutes.

BIG KEOKUK DAM ACROSS MISSISSIPPI DEDICATED TODAY

KEOKUK, Ia., Aug. 27.—With both shores of the Mississippi river at this point banked with spectators, and the river dotted with boats containing thousands of others the Keokuk dam, the greatest water power project in the world and one of the largest engineering feats of modern times, was officially dedicated today.
The governors of Iowa, Missouri and Illinois, noted engineers from various parts of the world, dignitaries from Washington and municipal officials from a score of cities and towns near here took part in the ceremonies. A delegation of eastern governors on their way to the governors conference at Colorado Springs stopped off to witness the dedication ceremonies.

The great Keokuk dam will furnish 200,000 horsepower in light and power to scores of cities from Dubuque to St. Louis. It stretches across the Father of Waters between Keokuk and Hamilton, Ill., and cost approximately \$25,000,000. The huge wall of cement, stone and brick is fifty-three feet high and forty-two feet at its widest point. Twenty-five hundred men worked three years to complete the dam in the construction of which 650,000 barrels of cement alone were used. It is 4649 feet in length and will make Copper lake a body of water 65 miles long, from one and one half to three and one-half miles wide and fifty feet deep.
Iowa and Illinois state troops paraded this morning and later acted as escorts to distinguished guests. Following the parade the state officials of Iowa, Illinois and Missouri met in the center of the dam where speeches were made. Later they adjourned to the government grounds where the formal dedication ceremonies were held.

The dam and mammoth power plant will be brilliantly illuminated at night, and there will be a display of fireworks.

BRISTOW'S INCOME TAX AMENDMENT DEFEATED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—Senator Bristow's income tax amendment to the tariff bill placing a tax as high as ten per cent on incomes over \$100,000 was defeated in the senate late this afternoon by a vote of sixteen to forty-six.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Aug. 27.—J. W. Rouse, a real estate man from Spokane, Wash., was arrested here this afternoon on request of Sheriff Stone of Spokane on a warrant charging obtaining money under false pretenses. He was found learning to run an automobile while the detectives say he had just bought. He had ten cents and a \$300 watch in his clothes. No details of the Spokane charges are known here.
