## ALMEDA MINE RECEIVER TO HUSTLE WORK

Under the management of Thos. S. Burley receiver for the Alameda mining property located in this county, the big mine will see activity and development that will leave its mark upon the commercial life of the community, and that will put the Alameda in the list of the great producers of the west.

An earnest of what can be expected from Mr. Burley was the appointment of John Ross, of Sutter Creek, California, as superintendent of the property, and Mr. Ross arrived in the city Tuesday night and Wednesday morning went out to the mine to assume active control over the operations on the ground. Mr. Ross is one of the foremost mining engineers in the United States, and his connection with the Alameda means that it will have the best expert management available. Before Mr. Burley accepted the receivership of the property Mr. Ross spent two weeks in making a complete investigation of the ore body and value, and it was upon that report that Mr. Burley decided to make the extensive developments he has now planned. Mr. Chambers has also arrived from Portland, and has assumed management of the smelting operations. Sixty men are now being employed for work in the mine, the number to be increased as fast as developments will permit.

## BORDER POLICE NAB MEXICAN BIRDMAN

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 28.—Joaquin Bach Alcalde, who claims to have accompanied Didier Masson on several flights over Guaymas harbor, Mexico, was arrested here today as he stepped from a Southern Pacific train, and hustled to the city jail. Special Agent John Bowen of the department of justice, who made the arrest, refused to explain his step and the jail blotter opposite Alcalde's name shows on the entry, "en route."

Alcalde declares Masson's bomb-throwing flights were successful, and that he destroyed one federal gunboat at Guaymas. He did not try to explain his presence in Los Angeles.

## CHURCH MEN MAKING ANTI-FIGHT PLANS

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 28.—Officers of the Los Angeles Church Federation were scheduled to meet today with State Senator Brown to complete plans to initiate a law prohibiting prize fights in California. It is believed that the federation propose a law enforcing the use of eight ounce gloves in boxing matches and limiting admission fees.

Jess Willard, opponent of "Bull" Young, when the latter received fatal injuries in a match here and the promoters and managers of the affair will appear in court tomorrow to answer charges of manslaughter.

PRETTY GIRL HOBO BALKS  
AT TELLING REAL NAME

OROVILLE, Cal., Aug. 28.—Half-frozen by her trip through the Feather river canyon, tired, travel-worn and half-starved, a pretty seventeen year old girl, who refused to give her name, is a guest of this city today after dropping off a freight train here in the most approved hobo fashion. The girl said she was en route to Sacramento from Salt Lake City, having traveled the entire distance by the "side door Pullman."

## UNITED ROADS PROMISE AID TO LINES OF CITY

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 28.—The first tangible effect of San Francisco's four to one vote this week authorizing the issue of \$3,500,000 bonds for extension of municipal street railroad lines came here today when Jess E. Lillenthal assumed the presidency of the United Railroads, vice Patrick Calhoun.

Warned by the fruit of Calhoun's policy of cutting down the number of street cars in use on the United Railroads and thus increasing the numbers and discomforts of strap-hangers, Lillenthal issued a statement promising hearty co-operation with the municipal lines. This was taken as an admission that bad treatment had resulted in the determination of the people to own their lines and as indicating a coming policy by capitalists which they design to prevent the future municipalization of the city's whole street railroad system if such a thing can be prevented.

Highly gratified by the endorsement of his policy, Mayor Rolph, with City Engineer O'Shaughnessy, today is hard at work on preliminary to the construction of the city's lines. Those first constructed will be tributary to the grounds of the 1915 fair, as the city is determined to capture for itself a great portion of the profits in carrying the fair crowds. Contracts for this work, and for other lines into residential districts, probably will be let by January 1, and before June 1 of next year it is promised tracklaying will commence.

## LEACH CROSS TO FIGHT BARRIEAU

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—Accompanied by his wife and his two brothers, Leach Cross, the New York lightweight, left today for Vancouver, B. C., where he is scheduled to meet Ernie Barrieau, a northwestern boy, in a fifteen-round bout on Labor Day.

The New Yorker closed for the match last evening and it will take the place of the originally scheduled Ritchie-Welsh affair.

"I am giving away a lot of weight to Barrieau," said Cross, "as I have agreed to allow him to weigh in at 142 ringside. However, I figure that if I win I may get a chance at either Ritchie or Welsh."

## STATE BARS DOUBTFUL STOCK SELLING PLAN

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 28.—The Oregon Telephone Herald and Oregon Enunciator company, both Portland concerns, were refused permission today to sell stock in the state by Corporation Commissioner Watson, on the grounds that neither company has wires or any means of securing the service promised to subscribers.

They are rival companies, the object being to furnish current news, descriptions of sporting events, music and other features by telephone to subscribers in business houses and private homes, through a central station.

## GREEK'S WHITE BRIDE ASKS POLICE AID

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 28.—Claiming to be the wife of the Greek Prince Commen-Paleogus, former confidential aide to the Sultan of Turkey, a pretty Englishwoman has appealed today to the police for financial aid for herself, three children and her husband, who are destitute. The prince fled Turkey, she said, when the Young Turks assumed power. He has made his living here by lecturing before various clubs. Temporary aid was provided.

COOS BAY IDEA OF  
CAVORTING IN BIG BURG

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 28.—After ordering \$50 worth of beer and whisky at a saloon here and later ordering more at a brewery, saying he was steward of the steamship Robert Dollar, James Brusch of Coos Bay, Or., was arrested. He admitted that he was not a steward and it was found that the steamer is not in port.

## OTHER GIRLS MAY TELL NEW ACTS OF DIGGS' PAL

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 28.—In the records of the government bearing on the trial of F. Drew Caminetti for violation of the Mann act appear the names of two young Sacramento girls whose purportedly grave accusations the defendant may be compelled to dispute before the jury.

Thus far these girls have been kept in the background, having been vaguely referred to once under cross-examination of Maury L. Diggs during his trial.

One is declared to be a former telephone operator at Sacramento, now in St. Catherine's academy here, and the other a fifteen-year-old girl of the capital city.

Their stories, if permitted to be told, will provide as sensational evidence as any yet adduced in these cases, according to the government prosecutors.

"The bars will surely be let down for the introduction of testimony by these two girls," declares Prosecutor Theodore Roebke, "if Caminetti takes the stand and opens up the subject as to why he and Diggs left Sacramento."

That is the answer made today to queries as to whether there would be any material variance of the showing against Caminetti over that upon which his companion, Diggs, was convicted.

The defendant's attorney stated positively that Caminetti would take the stand in his own behalf to deny the intent assigned in the indictment rather than to dispute the facts.

## ROSEBURG ATTORNEY FOUND WANDERING

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 28.—H. W. Evans, an attorney, who disappeared from his home yesterday while believed to have been mentally unbalanced through worry, was found today wandering aimlessly about the streets. It is believed he will soon recover. His disappearance caused much concern.

## MEDFORD SCHOOLS TO OPEN SEPTEMBER 8

Owing to the fact that some of the new books cannot be secured by Sept. 1, the grade schools and the high school will open for work Monday, September 8th.

All pupils who will be six years old on or before January 1st, 1914, may enter school Monday morning Sept. 8. Miss Coryell of the University of Washington and graduate of the Seattle Kindergarten Training School will open a kindergarten in the room formerly occupied by the sewing department in the high school building. She will be pleased to meet parents of children between the ages of four and six years, in Superintendent Collins' office at the high school building any afternoon this and next week between the hours of 1 and 5, for the purpose of enrolling pupils.

Pupils in all departments of our schools are advised not to purchase any text books until they receive the proper lists and instructions from their teachers next Monday morning, Sept. 8.

All pupils contemplating attending the Medford high school should report at the high school building Monday, September 8, between the hours of 9 and 12 a. m. and 1 and 4 p. m. for the purpose of making out their program of work, and registering. It is important that all pupils register on the above date.

A general teachers' meeting will be held in the auditorium of the high school building on Saturday afternoon, Sept. 6, at 2 o'clock. It is the duty of every teacher in the Medford public schools to be present at this meeting.

## NON-PURCHASE OF TICKETS NO HAVEN FOR CAMINETTI

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—The ruling of Federal Judge Van Fleet that it will not be necessary for the government to prove that F. Drew Caminetti actually took part in the purchase of railway tickets to transport Lola Norris and Martha Worthington to Reno, has knocked out the main drop of the defense.

"It is not necessary in this case to show that the defendant actually handled the money or that he handled the tickets, to connect him with this transaction," said the judge to the jury.

Caminetti's attorneys, who are relying on testimony to show that he merely acquiesced in the flight from Sacramento, interposed strenuous objection to the ruling.

## CALIFORNIA CROPS 15 PER CENT SHY

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 28.—The returns from last year's southern California citrus crop is but fifteen per cent less than average in spite of the severe frost, according to reports issued here today. Shortage of supplies caused higher prices. A. O. B. average price per box being 47 per cent higher than for the previous year.
