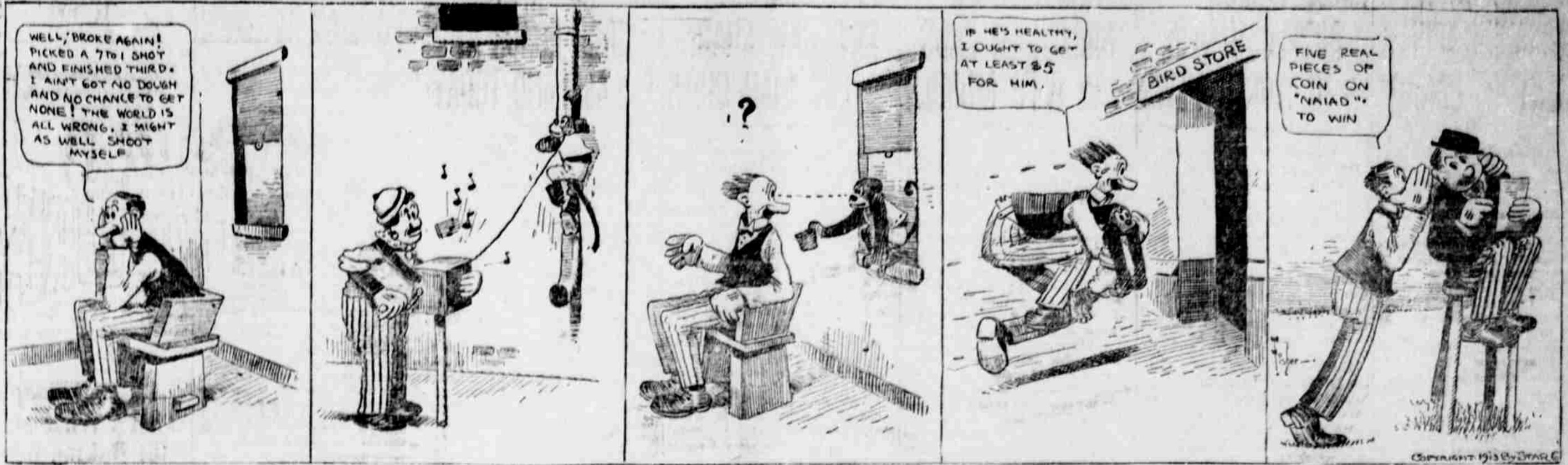


We'll Have to Excuse Mutt for This One
