

MISBRANDED FRUIT SEIZED IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 30.—Enforcing the law against mislabeling, a deputy of the state dairy and food commission today seized a shipment of apples from Lyle, Wash., which was said to contain Gravenstein, but which really consisted of a dozen different varieties.

Officials of the commission announced that no fruit will be allowed on sale in Oregon if wrongly labeled. The state will also force growers to indicate the exact count of fruit in each package.

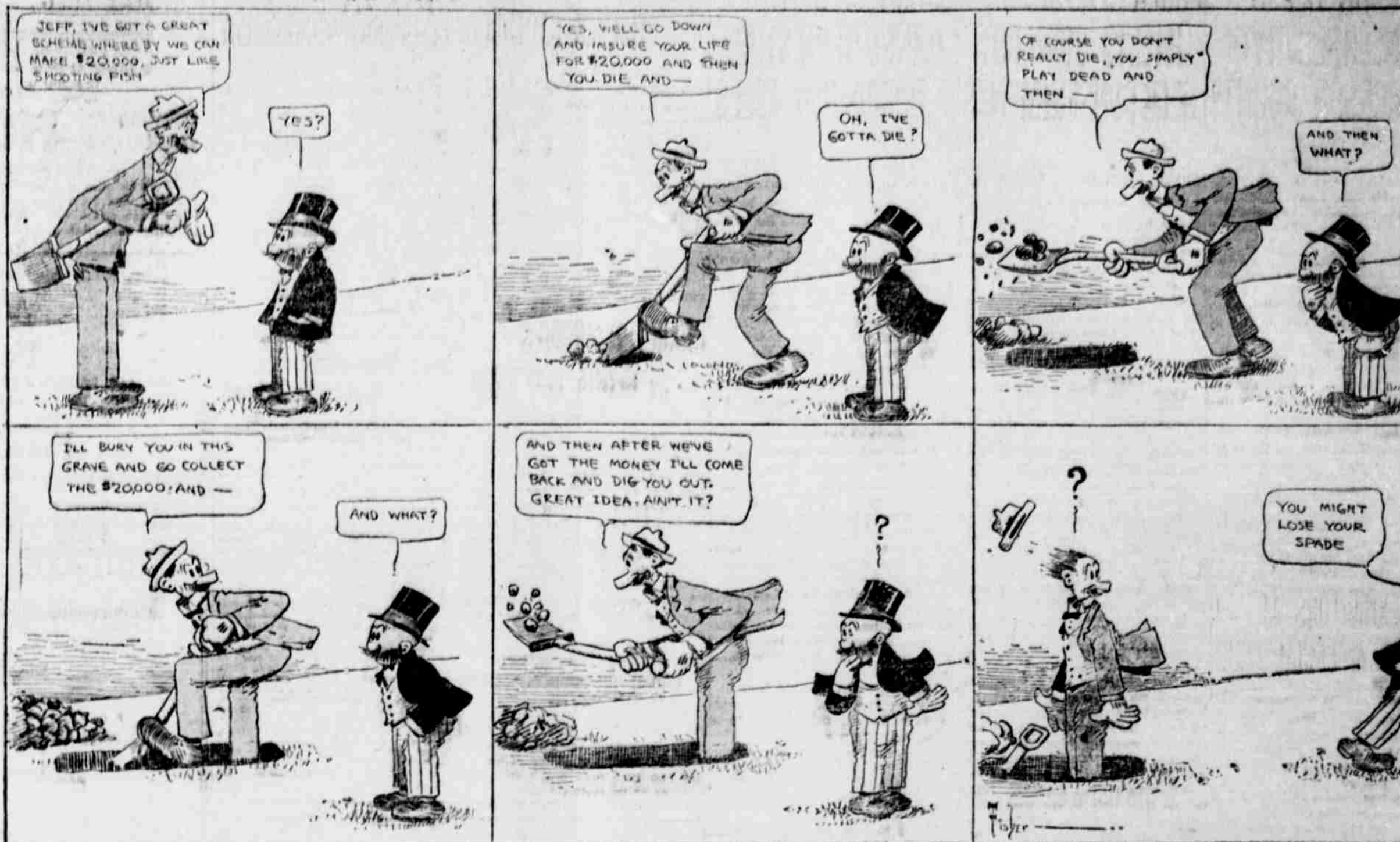
