

GAVE LOLA NORRIS WEDDING PROMISE WITNESS TELLS

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 3.—That F. Drew Caminetti, son of Commissioner General of Immigration A. Caminetti, on trial in the United States District court here for violating the Mann white slave act by transporting Miss Lola Norris from Sacramento to Reno for immoral purposes, admitted on the return trip to Sacramento that he had promised to marry the girl both before and after leaving Sacramento, was alleged at the opening of court today by W. R. Doan, a Sacramento court reporter, the first witness called to the stand.

Doan testified that with Assistant District Attorney Atkinson of Sacramento he boarded the train at Truckee and accompanied the Diggs-Caminetti party to Sacramento on the day they returned home. He declared that Atkinson questioned both Caminetti and Miss Norris, and that he took down the questions and answers in shorthand. Doan was permitted to read from his notes.

"Did you tell Miss Norris that you would get a divorce and marry her as soon as the law allowed?" Doan said Atkinson asked Caminetti.

"I believe I did," was the answer. "And did you make the promise in good faith?"

"Yes," Caminetti is alleged to have answered.

Doan declared that Atkinson told Caminetti there were two charges pending against him in Sacramento and that he need not answer questions if he believed they would incriminate him.

Atkinson then questioned Miss Norris, the witness declared. "Did Caminetti promise to marry you?" she was asked.

"Yes, he most certainly did," was the answer. "Otherwise I would not have made the trip."

TALK TALENT CREAMERY AT GOOD ROAD MEET

A good audience turned out at Talent Tuesday evening to hear speeches in behalf of good roads and road bonds and hear a creamery discussed. The speakers were Porter J. Neff and W. H. Gore of Medford, Bert R. Greer of Ashland, Wm. R. Bagley and others of Talent.

Mr. Greer stated that his trip to the Eureka tri-state road meet had convinced him that if Jackson County wanted the Pacific highway, it must act at once; hence he was now in favor of the road bonds, having previously opposed them.

A discussion of a proposed creamery for Talent followed and a committee was named to make preliminary arrangements.

This move was taken when Earl Rogers, counsel for the defense, exhibited a telegram from San Diego stating that Eddie Webster, one of the defendants, was under arrest there and could not appear in court.

Doan said Miss Norris then refused to answer further questions along this line.

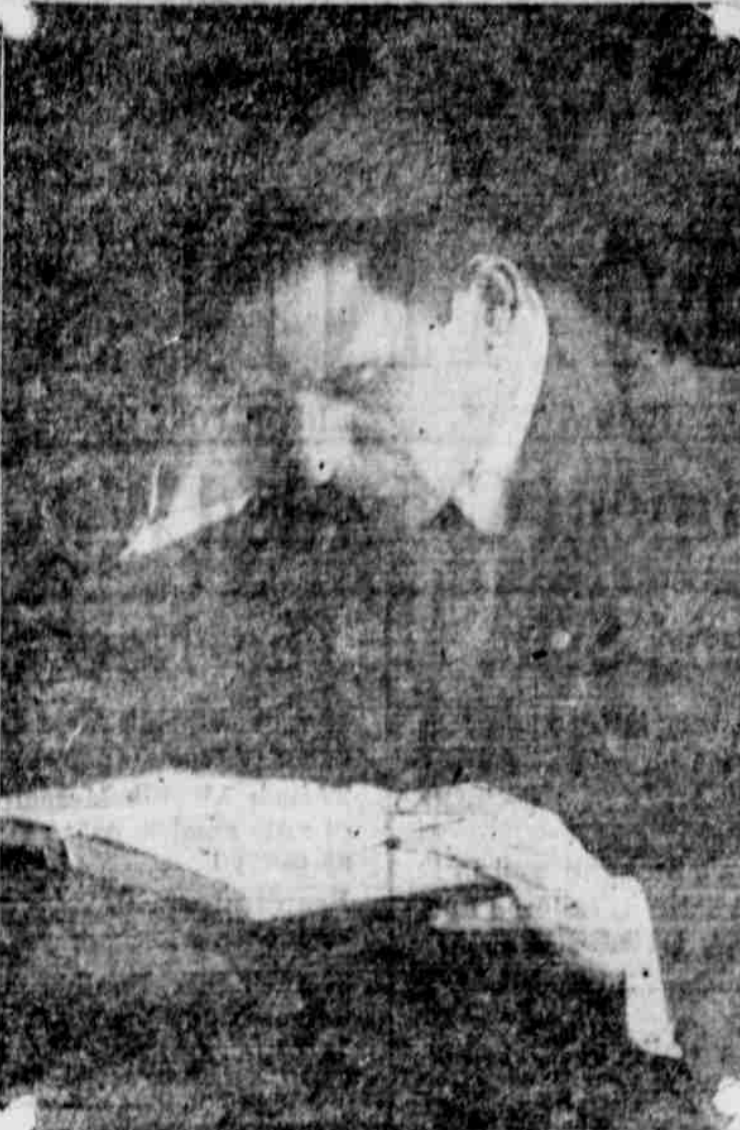
"Did Caminetti ever say to you that his only regret in leaving Sacramento was because of his older child?" Atkinson asked Miss Norris.

"Yes," was the alleged answer. "He expressed great devotion for the child and said he would send for her as soon as the divorce proceedings were over way."

Attorney Woodworth for the defense asked Doan whether Miss Norris was asked whether she had been intimate with Caminetti before leaving Sacramento but Doan's note did not contain any reference to this angle.

Doan was then excused. The court then granted a temporary recess, after which it was expected Caminetti will be called to the stand.

FRUIT EXCHANGES GET TOGETHER

Closer relations between rival fruit districts, and associations are expected as the result of a harmony meeting held Monday in Portland which was attended by R. H. Parsons and A. C. Randall, representing the Rogue River Fruit and Produce association. Representatives were present from 22 fruit associations, including those from the North Pacific fruit distributors and the Northwestern Fruit association. The following resolution was adopted.

"Whereas, it is the consensus of opinion of the representatives of growers' organizations, shippers and dealers in deciduous fruits this day assembled, that an organization should be perfected in the Northwest to promote the welfare of the deciduous fruit industry; now, therefore, be it

"Resolved, That we recommend to the growers and shippers of, and dealers in, deciduous fruits in the northwest states, that at the Spokane Apple Show, to be held at Spokane, Wash., there be perfected an organization similar to the Citrus Protective League of California, to promote the standardization of grade and were present from 22 associations, of necessary legislation, transportation rates and regulations, and other matters of vital interest to the deciduous fruit industry of the northwestern states, other than the sale and marketing of fruits."

P. O. E. except exalted ruler, and in the Medford lodge was past exalted ruler and was a delegate to the national convention municipal government, having served at Atlantic City.
