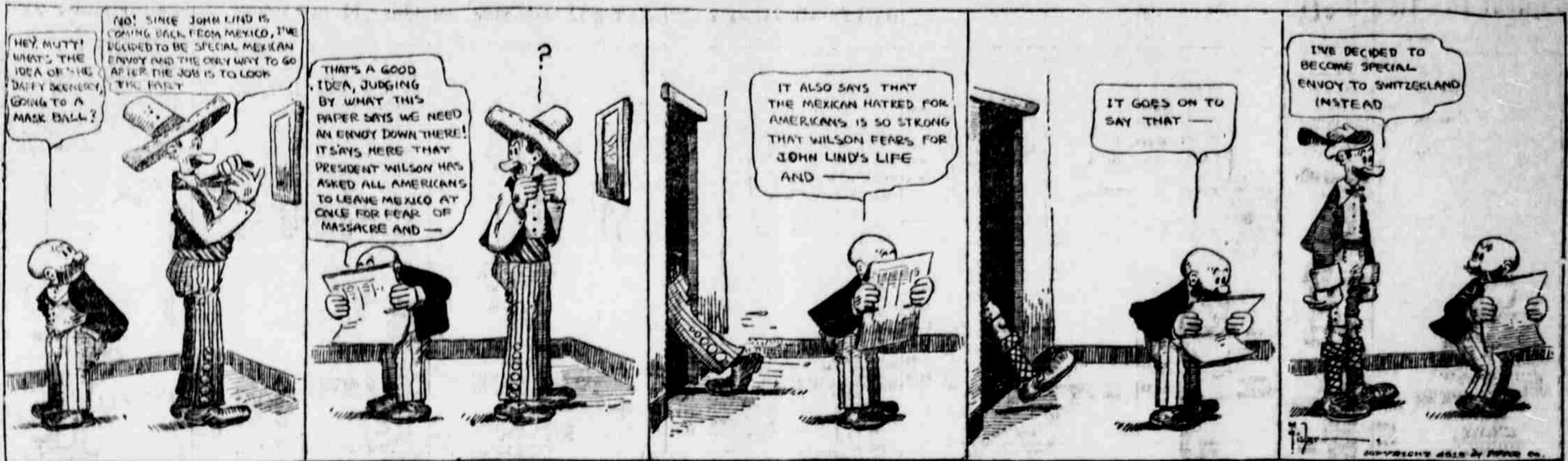


Anyway You Look at It, Mutt Shows Rare Judgment at Times

FILL MAYORALTY CHAIR VACANCY FRIDAY SESSION

The naming of an appointee to fill the vacancy in the mayor's chair, caused by the sudden death of W. W. Effert Tuesday night will probably be made Friday night. The council adjourned Tuesday until Thursday night, and to retain its legality must meet at that time. An adjournment will then be taken until after the last and rites of the stricken official. Until then, president of the council, John T. Summerville, acts as mayor ex-officio.

The city charter conflicts in regard to this point. Ex-City Attorney Neff holds that the council should select one from outside their own number. City Attorney McCabe contends that the section providing that "the president of the council shall be acting mayor during the absence of the mayor" covers the case.

Beginning at the corner between fractional sections thirteen (13) and fourteen (14) in township forty-eight (48) north of range seven (7) west of the Mount Diablo Meridian, California, connecting with the survey of the State Highway of California; thence northerly along the route as now staked out to present county road; thence following as near as practical the main county road into and through the city of Ashland, a municipal corporation of Jackson county, Oregon; thence following the main traveled county road through the towns of Talent, Phoenix, Medford and Central Point, in a northerly direction; thence following, as near as practical, the county road in a northerly direction to a point at or near the stream known as Rogue River; thence following the main traveled county road along said stream in a westerly direction, and terminating at the point where the main traveled county road on the south side of Rogue River crosses the county line between the counties of Jackson and Josephine, Oregon, and at or near said stream known as the Rogue river. The terminal of said road, as herein directed, is definite and permanent. The line above described between the terminal thereof shall be as herein ordered, and shall follow the most practical route for a permanent road, and said road shall be a permanent road and highway through said county.
