KNABENSCHUE MAKES TRIP IN PASSENGER DIRIGIBLE

PASADENA, Cal., Sept. 4.—After months of preparation, accompanied by mishaps and hard luck, of various sorts, Roy Knabenschue made a successful flight today in his huge passenger dirigible, with which he proposes to institute the first regular aerial passenger service in the United States from this city to nearby beach and mountain resorts.

Knabenschue was accompanied by two passengers and carried more than 2000 pounds extra weight, representing what his dirigible could do as a passenger carrier. He rose about 800 feet, circled around the city for twenty minutes and returned to his starting point.

COUNTY ORDERS SHORT CUT ROAD

The county court Thursday made an order accepting the report of the viewers of the proposed short cut roads, running northeast from the Pacific & Eastern tracks to the present road, a distance of a little over a mile, which will save over a miles travel to residents of that section. The court ordered that the road be constructed when the petitioners pay in half the awards in damages, which amount to \$1300 and half the cost of the road, estimated at \$2600. This will probably act as a damper upon the enthusiasm of the advocates.
