Eifert, who while filling the highest honor and performing the highest duty in the gift of his fellow-citizens, was summoned by the Father of all to lay aside those duties for those we know not of; and that we may attest the respect due him for his industry, kindness, and perseverance, which gained for him the place he occupied, by virtue of my office as acting mayor of the City of Medford, Oregon, I respectfully request of all citizens of said city, that on Friday, September 5th, 1913, between the hours of 2 and 4 o'clock in the afternoon of said day, they lay aside their several callings and occupations, and close their places of business during said time while the relatives and friends of the departed are performing for him, the last and sacred rites.

The funeral of the late Mayor W. W. Eifert will be held at 2:00 o'clock Friday afternoon at the Elks hall under the auspices of the Elks and Knights of Pythias lodges. The remains will lie in state from 10 o'clock to 12 o'clock in the morning at Elks hall and can be viewed by friends. The funeral sermon will be preached by the Rev. W. F. Shields, and the funeral parade be participated in by the various lodges with which the deceased was affiliated.

Acting Mayor Summerville has issued a proclamation asking business houses to close from 2 o'clock until 4 o'clock.

Relatives from out of the city arrived today to be present at the funeral.

SPECULATION RIFE OVER MAYORALTY

Speculation is rife concerning the choice of the city council for mayor to succeed the late W. W. Eifert, with street talk strongly in favor of C. E. Gates, who ran second in the election last January. It is pointed out that Mr. Gates was next to Mr. Eifert at the polls, and that by his selection, the council would be carrying out the wishes of the people.

There is also a strong undercurrent in favor of ex-Mayor Canon, who is at present absent from the city, but who for four years served the city in an efficient manner, giving a business like administration.

Among the councilmen are several who would not be averse to the job, although none have committed themselves.

DENVER OPENS CITY "SPOONERY"

The official "spoonstress" will be Mrs. J. M. Risley, matron of the Neighborhood House. She will act as official chaperon, official advisor and first aid to Cupid for the young women who frequent the house. A mere man, who has not yet been selected, will be on hand later to advise the youthful swains.

WOMEN CLUBS OF VALLEY VOTE FOR FEDERATION PLAN

The Reciprocity Day held at Ashland on Tuesday was a most successful and profitable one. The federated clubs of the city were hostesses to the clubs of Rogue river valley. Fully two hundred women were present, with about twenty-five from Medford, and others from Rogue River and various points along the line. Lunch was served from the lunch room in the park, cafeteria style, and proved to be an ideal way of taking care of the company. After lunch the program was held.

The address of welcome given by Mrs. Gard, president of the Ashland federated clubs, was responded to by Mrs. E. E. Gore, president of the Greater Medford club. Mrs. Walters of the Portland Parents' Educational Bureau was present and gave a most inspiring talk covering the work of that organization. This was followed by reports from the various clubs concerning their plans of work for the coming year.

After a brief talk showing the advantages of federation by Mrs. W. G. Davidson of Medford, a discussion was held to determine the sentiment of the assembly upon this matter. As a result a motion that steps be taken toward the federation of the women's club into a Southern Oregon district, was unanimously carried. Mrs. W. G. Davidson of Medford was elected president, Mrs. Arthur Conklin of Grants Pass, secretary; Mrs. Gard of Ashland and Mrs. Gillmore of Rogue River together with a representative from each club in the valley and the two officers elected, are to form a committee on organization. A motion was passed favoring good roads, and a resolution introduced by Mrs. E. E. Gore, thanking the Ashland ladies for a very happy day.

SPECIAL COURT TO TRY DIVORCE CASES

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 3.—A domestic relations court, with absolute jurisdiction in all local divorce cases and with the full powers of a circuit court, today came into existence in Detroit. It is said to be the only court of its kind in the world. Judge Arthur J. Lacy, who will preside, said today that the creation of the new court places Detroit and Wayne county far in advance of any other city or county in the union in the matter of solving vital social problems.

"The new court will handle 2000 pro confesso divorce cases each year," said Judge Lacy today, "who explained that he based his estimate upon the work of similar nature done in other courts of the city and which in the future will be handled by the domestic relations tribunal exclusively. The work in connection with the new court will probably be divided under the following sub-heads: divorce suits; abandonment, desertion and other felony cases, cases of cruelty to wives, applications for warrants for non-support, miscellaneous complaints for contributing to child delinquency, cruelty to children, violations of compulsory education law and other minor complaints."

Drew Caminetti forgot her own glaring wrongs yesterday afternoon long enough to testify in behalf of her husband, who deserted her for Lola Norris.

She told of her threats to kill any woman she caught out with her husband. She recounted his nervous fears, his sleeplessness, his refusal to eat—all of which worried her in the closing days before the denouement of her life tragedy, and of her futile efforts to have him tell her his troubles.

"I knew," said Mrs. Diggs, "in her testimony, "that my husband and Caminetti were going out with the two girls under an assumed name. I told Caminetti that I knew all about it, when he came to my home."

"I also told Caminetti that he was the cause of my husband going out so much and leaving me alone. Often when Maury was at home, Caminetti would ring up and then they would go out together. A girl whom I afterward learned was Miss Warrington also kept calling him up at my home."

"A girl high in society who would run around with a married man is not fit for my husband to run around with."
