NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—Installation of the most elaborate and complete "beauty parlor" in the world by Mrs. Madeline Force Astor, widow of Colonel John Jacob Astor, in her Fifth avenue mansion is causing much speculation here today. Friends of the family believe it means Mrs. Astor soon is to take her place in society.

Connecting with Mrs. Astor's bedroom is a room 15x15 feet. This has been fitted up by W. Gentry Shelton, the electrical wizard, at a cost of \$60,000, and he is said to have canvassed the world for the last word in electrical beauty contrivances. An electrical hair dryer, above a hair-dressing chair of carved wood inlaid with gold, emits either hot or cold air as desired. There are also electric face blanchers, and vibrators of the most modern types.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Sept. 11.—Rattlesnake and moccasin venom is a cure for tuberculosis, cancer and syphilis.

Declaration to this effect was made here today by Dr. John T. Jones, of New Orleans, who promises further details in an article he is preparing for the London Lancet. Forty persons are under treatment here by Dr. Jones in an effort to prove the effectiveness of his cure.

A dose of the new cure, Dr. Jones says, is comprised of a one-hundredth part of a grain of the venom from the rattlesnake and the moccasin blended. He said he accidentally discovered the purported cure when a rattlesnake bit a negro suffering from syphilis and tuberculosis. The negro recovered.

FREE ENTRY OF EXHIBITS FOR SAN FRANCISCO FAIR
