RECORD CROWD GREETSMEDFORD DAY AT FAIR

Biggest Attendance of Year on the Grounds This Afternoon—Business Houses and Schools Closed—Many From Country.

Last Day Tomorrow — Management Adds Feature Attractions—Races and Broncho Busting.

Medford day at the county fair gave promise this afternoon of breaking the attendance record of over 3000 for last year. The business houses, banks and schools are closed for the afternoon. It is also school day at the fair, and Medford, Jacksonville and Central Point sent a full quota of children.

At 1:30 this afternoon the livestock parade was held. In the line of march were the aristocracy of Rogue River valley stock. After this event the judges made their awards on the winners.

By noon the crowd began to gather at the grounds, indicating a heavy attendance for this afternoon. Many country people came in their rigs. The fruit exhibit building drew good crowds all morning.

This afternoon and tomorrow are the big days of the fair, and the management have provided a big attraction list.

The attendance to date, while in excess of last year, still leaves a balance on the wrong side of the ledger. Today's and tomorrow's crowds are expected to pull the fair association even on the heavy expenses.

As an added feature, John Miller of Pendleton, Or., will try to ride Nero, bucking bull, for twenty seconds for a \$100 purse. John says he can ride Nero. Others have fizzled daily. Also John Tyler of Gazelle, Cal., will try to ride Grizzly Murphy, a bad horse, still unriden. Doc Helms' string of outlaws will also be at hand for busting.

The racing card tomorrow will consist of two running races, free-for-all trot and paces between the winners of the week, bringing forth the cream of the entries.

THIRTY DAYS IN JAIL FOR LOOPING LOOP

WOMEN ARRESTED BY STATE TROOPS CALUMET DISTRICT

CALUMET, Mich., Sept. 12.—State troops today continued to arrest women by wholesale throughout the copper mine strike district. Most of the prisoners are strikers' wives, accused of intimidating or actually beating strikebreakers.

Besides the women, a number of men were arrested by the militia, including Yankee Terzich, a member of the Western Federation of Miners' International association. President Charles F. Moyer of the federation was expected to arrive here this afternoon and hundreds of strikers were ready to welcome him.

Fearing clashes, the police and troops have forbidden street gatherings.

ACTIVE BUYING OF HARRIMAN STOCKS

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—Active buying of the Harriman stocks featured the opening of the stock market today. General price changes were unusually small, but the undertone was firm. Reading, after opening slightly lower, advanced nearly a point. Virginia-Carolina Chemical rose 2 1/2. Later Canadian Pacific jumped 2 3/8 and Union Pacific nearly as much. Reading, Lehigh, New York Central and Interborough Metropolitan preferred were strong. Bonds were steady.

The market closed strong.

MILITANT LEADER MUST ANSWER QUERIES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—Officials of the immigration service announced today that Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the noted suffragette leader, who is soon to sail for the United States, will be detained at Ellis Island and compelled to appear before a special board of inquiry.

The department of labor has taken up the matter and intends to see that Mrs. Pankhurst will be asked to explain some of her acts abroad in connection with her political campaigns.

FEAR ATTEMPT AT RESCUE BY THAW'S FRIENDS

Hearing of Case Is Again Continued—Town Filling Up With Canadians and Woodsmen Who Are Violent Partisans of Prisoner.

Attorneys Propose to Allow Thaw Fair Hearing Before Governor of New Hampshire.

COLEBROOK, N. H., Sept. 12.—Justice of the Peace Carr today continued the Harry Thaw case until tomorrow by request from both Thaw's lawyers and New York state's legal representatives.

As a result of the two conferences Thaw's hearing on the accusation that he is a fugitive from justice, originally set for this forenoon, was delayed. The defense, as well as the representatives of New York state, were afraid Thaw would be released on the fugitive charge, and in this event it was considered extremely likely that his more irresponsible friends would attempt to get him away from Colebrook by force, precipitating a serious clash and perhaps loss of life.

Put It Up to Glasgow

Stone proposed to Thaw to allow a fair hearing of the case before Governor Falker at Concord, if Jerome, in return, would agree, in the event Felker decided against the prisoner, to five days' delay for the institution of habeas corpus proceedings.

Should Jerome, who did not immediately make up his mind, accede to this arrangement, the fugitive charge will be dropped, Thaw sent to the Lancaster jail and the matter at once submitted to the governor.

Thomas McLane, one of Thaw's Canadian friends, intimated today that he might make an international matter of the case on the ground that an American's rights had been violated by Canada.

Strangers in City

The basis of Sheriff Drew's anxiety is the number of strangers in town believed to be friends of the prisoner. The place fairly swarmed with them today. Many of them, Drew asserted, were from Conitocook, Quebec, and others, he said, he recognized as lumberjacks from Norton Mills, Vt.

The police ordered from town yesterday two high-powered automobiles seen standing beside the building in which are Thaw's lawyers' offices. The chauffeurs denied they were in the employ of Thaw, but the police refused to accept any explanations from them.

WIRELESS STOPS SPEEDING TRAINS

BERLIN, Sept. 12.—Experiments being made on the German railroads with the wireless apparatus invented by Christopher Wirth of Nuremberg, by means of which trains running at full speed may be instantly brought to a stop from the dispatcher's office are proving highly successful. An apparatus invented by Wirth and located in the baggage car, instantly sets the brakes by a wireless signal from the dispatcher's office. It is the opinion of experts that the invention will be a great boon to the railroad companies.

CALL MEETING TO PLAN GUN SHOOT

A meeting of the Medford Rod and Gun club has been called for Saturday evening at 8 o'clock at Ewing's Gun Store to discuss arranging a shoot at Medford next week, when the creek marksmen of the country return from the California shoots in progress this week. Dr. Seeley, president of the club, has issued the call upon the request of local strikers.

WATSON GIVES GENERAL DENIAL TO MULHALL

Flat Contradiction of Former Lobbyist's Statement Regarding Employment by Manufacturers Made by Famed Indiana Representative.

Admits That When Candidate for Governor Mulhall Offered Aid, But Asserts He Refused Assistance.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—General denial of all the allegations made against him by Colonel Martin M. Mulhall of Baltimore, former self-styled chief lobbyist for the National Association of Manufacturers, was voiced here today by former Representative James Watson of Indiana before the house lobby investigating committee. Mulhall had testified that Watson while a member of congress was paid a weekly salary by the N. A. M. to antagonize all union labor legislation.

"I was never approached by the officials of the association or asked to favor any legislation in which it was interested," said Watson. "I was never a lobbyist. I also wish to deny that I ever put friends of the N. A. M. on house committees."

"You need not tell me that the sun shines, you need not tell me that the canary sings, and you need not tell me that any man could tell 'Uncle Joe' Cannon whom to put on committees. Sometimes the speaker asked me what I thought of this or that man, but he never said why he wanted to know. I always told him without asking why."

Watson admitted that when he was a candidate for the governor of Indiana in 1908 that Mulhall offered to help him with organized labor, and that he told Mulhall to proceed. He denied that Mulhall ever had collected funds for any of his political campaigns. Watson said that he had agreed with officials of the N. A. M. that certain labor measures were unwise, adding:

"I want to say emphatically that I never knew a corrupt man in the house; that I never knew of any attempt to corrupt a congressman, and that I do not believe any members of the house are corruptible."

DOUGLAS COUNTY TO IMPROVE CANYON ROAD

COTTAGE GROVE, Or., Sept. 12.—The county court of Douglas county has commenced work on the Pass creek canyon road, long known as the worst piece of public highway between Portland and San Francisco. Bids submitted two weeks ago were rejected and the county court has put in its own crew. With continued favorable weather the work will yet be completed this fall. Farmers and other residents of Comstock, Drain, Aulauk and Divide and the Roseburg Commercial club put forth the effort which resulted in getting work started on this road.

McANENY NOMINATED IN GAYNOR'S PLACE

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—The Gaynor Independent league today chose George McAneny, president of the borough of Manhattan, as its candidate for mayor to take the place of the late Mayor William J. Gaynor. McAneny was a candidate for the fusion mayoralty nomination, but was defeated by John Parroy Mitchell, though he did receive the fusion nomination for president of the board of aldermen. His nomination still further complicates the already extremely complicated New York mayoralty situation.

Borough President McAneny this afternoon declined the nomination for mayor in opposition to Mitchell, the fusion nominee.

JUDGES CALLED AS DIGGS' WITNESSES IN PERJURY TRIAL

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 12.—Three judges of the superior court of Sacramento were called as character witnesses by the defense today when the trial of Maury I. Diggs and Charles B. Harris, a Sacramento attorney charged with subornation of perjury, was resumed here before United States District Judge Van Fleet.

Judge Post was the first witness. He testified that he had known Harris for eight years and that his reputation was good. Judge Peter J. Fields testified to the same effect. Judge J. W. Shields was more specific. He recalled that he had discussed Harris with Grove L. Johnson, father of Governor Johnson, and both had agreed that Harris' reputation for truth and integrity was good.

District Attorney Waehhorst of Sacramento also testified to the general good reputation of the defendant.

Miss Nell Barton was the next witness. She swore that she had been imperturbed by Harris to "fix" things with Marsha Warrington to testify falsely in the Diggs-Caminetti white slave cases.

JAPS DEMAND INDEMNITY FOR VICTIMS OF RIOTS

TOKIO, Sept. 12.—With 2000 Japanese marines inside the walls of Nankin, China, where three Japanese were killed in a riot recently, with the Japanese consul in the city protected by a battery of quick firers and with five Japanese warships in the river along side the city, the Tokio government today peremptorily demanded immediate acquiescence by China in its demands for indemnity for the death of Japanese subjects. The Pekin cabinet was considering the demand this afternoon.

PEKIN, Sept. 12.—The Chinese parliament met in joint session today to outline the president's duties and to provide methods for electing him. It is generally expected that Muan Kai will be chosen to succeed himself as president.

BEGINS WARFARE ON CAUCUS SYSTEM

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—Attacking the "evils of the caucus system," Representative Anderson of Minnesota, who yesterday resigned from the ways and means committee, as a protest, introduced in the house today a resolution creating a commission to investigate legislative methods and practices in congress. Anderson declared that this is the first step in a fight for simpler, more efficient and more economical methods in the house.

Majority 2359. Complete official returns on the good roads bond issue election, compiled by County Clerk Gardner give the bonds a majority of 2359. The vote "yes" was 3674, and "no" 1315. Medford precincts gave a majority of 1473 for the bonds, with 1634 for, and only 163 against. Ashland voted 640 for, and 276 against, a majority of 364.

Antioch, Applegate, Climax, Lake Creek, Sams Valley, Sterling, Trail, Union, Watkins and Wimer, ten precincts voted against the bonds. North Main precinct gave the biggest majority vote for, 315, and Watkins, in the extreme southwestern part of the county, failed to muster a single vote in 29 for the bonds.

SUPERMAN FOOTPAD AND POET IN PRISON

PARIS, Sept. 12.—His last hope of appeal gone, France's famous "superman" footpad and "poet" today began his term of six years' imprisonment. Jean Michelon is his name. He sandwiched a woman and robbed her of \$700, but when betrayed by a friend, spotted an ode to the sun before the police. "I may be a crook," he said, "but I am an ideal man; I am a superman. I crack a lady on the head, I grab her coin and run; but any dub that has no bed can touch me for the man." The authorities are divided over whether Michelon is crazy or clever.

SCORE OF SUSPECTS IN JAIL FOR DAYLIGHT ROBBERY

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—The police had more than a score of suspects locked up today in connection with the highway robbery yesterday of Bank Messenger McAvoy and the loss of \$4500 cash by the Garfield Park State Savings bank. It was admitted, however, that the prisoners were simply dragnetted and that there really is no clue to the identity of the robbers.

Jap's Wife Elopes. LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 11.—At the request of Nachigora Taniguchi, the police were "re-searching" today for his wife, who is of "ordinary fat round face," and who he claimed has eloped with a country man.
