

BOY OF FOURTEEN FORGES CHECKS ON EXTENSIVE SCALE

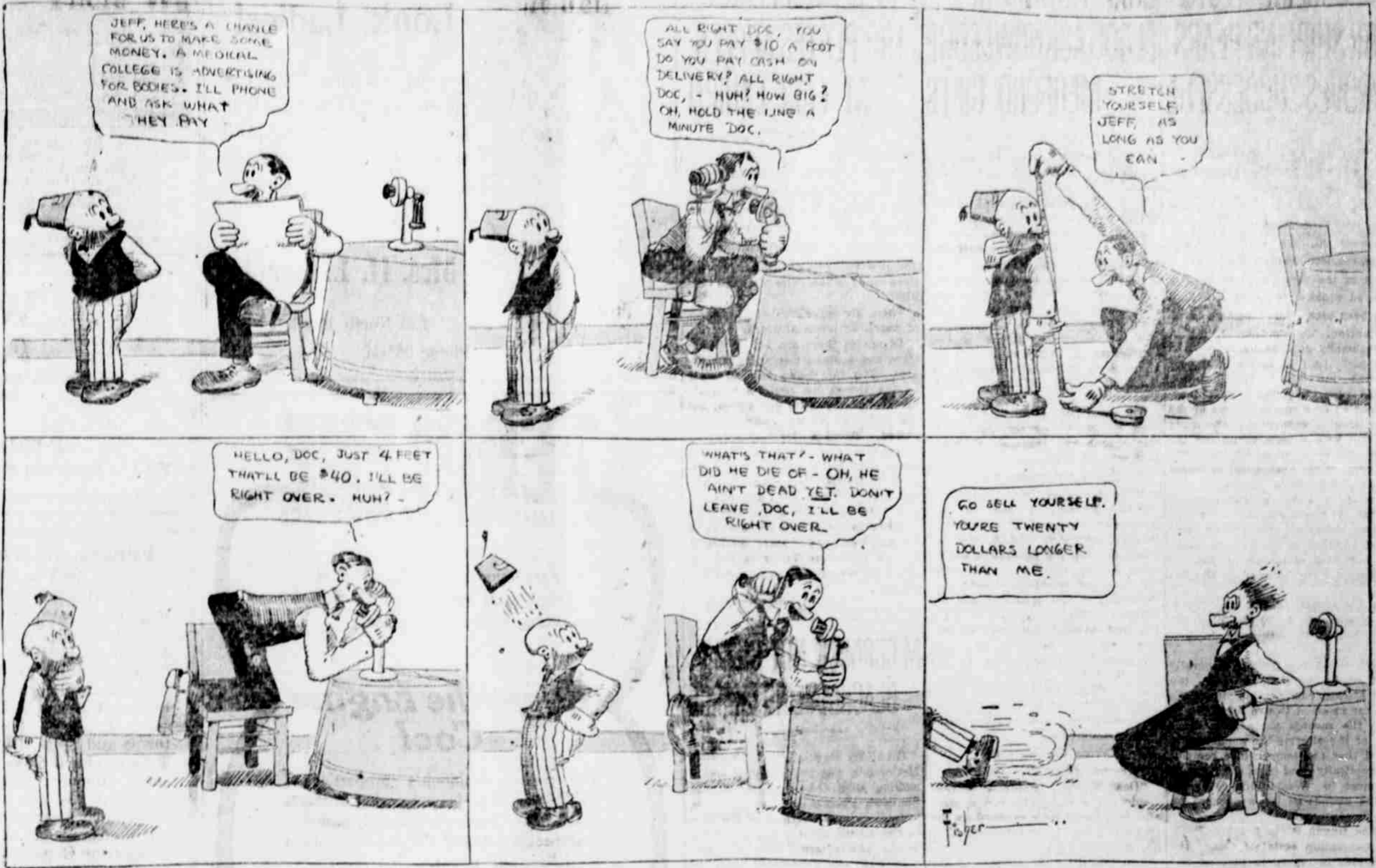
