

MEDFORD GOLF CLUB WRITTEN UP IN SEATTLE TIMES

(Seattle Times.)
Only little bits of the truth have been trickling Seattlewards concerning the development of the golf idea in Oregon, and it awaited the coming here last week of R. C. F. Astbury of Medford and Portland to amplify. The latter, with H. Chandler Egan, former national golf champion, and Vilas Beckwith, another well-known golfer, are the men who have given Medford its nine-hole course. The story of the obstacles surmounted and the results obtained is illustrative of what men will do when they set out to apply the gospel of golf.

Not so well acquainted with what has been accomplished at Eugene, yet Astbury was approached by J. Wilhelm, one of the active spirits of the golf club at the latter Oregonian city, shortly before he left for Seattle, and the Medford man was asked to work with the man from Eugene in the development of a team from the two golf clubs that will play teams at Portland, Tacoma and Seattle, probably spending a week on the trip. Play over the Eugene nine-hole course has been going on for several months.

Old Course Abandoned
After an experimental course had been tried for several months, and several thousand dollars had been spent on it, trouble arose between the Medford Golf and Country club and the landlord of the site, following its organization of slightly over two years ago, and the course was abruptly abandoned. Then the club, not discouraged at this experience, promptly purchased an eighty-acre tract and went to work on what is now its present course. A tournament three weeks ago formally opened the course.

With a membership of seventy-five, including men and women, in a city of 8000, the club went ahead to realize its playing course, the construction of a clubhouse and the laying out of two tennis courts. The ideas carried out on the various holes were largely offered or approved by Chandler Egan, while the experience of his associates, Astbury and Beckwith, who had visited many courses, both at home and abroad, helped considerably.

While most of the money was per the subscription route, there were many members who supplied men and teams in lieu of cash, with the result that the Medford course rapidly took form and realized every detail carefully planned by the prime movers in the object.

Character of Ground

The ground generally is of a washed gravel surface. There is a turf under way of development from the sowing of more than \$400 worth of grass seed. The putting greens are of the usual sand character, circular in shape, but in time turf is to be grown for the flag ground. Pending the coming of the turf, winter rules are being applied, allowing of teeing the ball on the fairways. The course is 3000 yards in length, and as the club grows the inevitable eighteen holes are coming. Adjoining land can be readily obtained.

The general contour of the ground is rolling, but not so much so as at the Seattle Golf club course. An artificial lake has been built and this affords two water hazards. The very first hole, in fact, is a carry of about 100 yards over this water, the hole being 300 yards over all.

Tennis Also Played

In addition to golf, tennis is played, as is indicated. Then there is a trap-shooting stand on the grounds and indoor golf is planned for the winter. Every day, the writer is assured, there are upwards of fifty people out at the links, traps or courts of the Medford Golf and Country club.

At a recent election, Reginald Parsons of Seattle and Medford, was chosen president; Conro Piero, vice-president, and K. Chandler Egan, secretary-treasurer. The latter is also captain of all the various teams and he has assistants for each division of the country club life.

R. C. F. Astbury is chairman of the greens committee, and in addition to those named, the following constitute the board of trustees: Leonard Carpenter, George H. Daggert, Frank Madden and E. G. Burgess, Jr.

LEACH CROSS TO MEET CHAMPION

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 17.—Lightweight Champion Willie Ritchie has accepted today an offer to meet Leach Cross in a ten round no decision bout in New York City. A definite date for the match has not been fixed, but it will be staged early in October. Ritchie says he is guaranteed \$10,000 for his end and has the right to accept instead a percentage of the receipts of the bout if the attendance totals more than his guarantee. Ritchie also announced his intention of defending his title in San Francisco Thanksgiving Day. He has an offer from Promoter James W. Coffroth to meet Harlem Tommy Murphy here on that date, and he will give Coffroth a definite answer before night.

TAMMANY LOSES PRIMARIES; RESULT CHEERS UP SULZER

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 17.—"Thank God, the bosses are hearing from the people at last," was Governor William Sulzer's only comment today after consulting the returns from yesterday's primaries, many of which showed a sentiment distinctly against Tammany and consequently friendly to himself. Sulzer remained in his office all night, going to bed at daylight after listening to the available returns from the primaries.

It was evident that Sulzer wanted to talk for publication, but his lawyers, fearing the effect of anything he might say, urged silence and the governor obeyed them. It was expected today that Mrs. Sulzer will tell the high court in her own way how she indulged in the speculations which the prosecution charges against her husband, asserting that she was led into them as a result of a Tammany plot to involve her husband.

The most impressive figure in the impeachment court probably will be Chief Justice Edward Cullen of the court of appeals, who will preside. All admit that Cullen is fearless and his opinion was expected strongly to influence the court. There will be an excellent opportunity, too, for every one to know what his opinion is, inasmuch as the judges vote ahead of the lawmakers on all questions, and the names are called alphabetically. Cullen's is second on the list.

KILBANE WINNER OF BOUT WITH WALSH

BOSTON, Sept. 17.—Fight fans here are convinced today that Johnny Kilbane of Cleveland is a real featherweight champion, as a result of his twelve-round victory here last night over Jimmy Walsh of Boston. The men met at catchweights. Kilbane fought in splendid form. In the tenth round he floored Walsh with a right-hand smash to the jaw, and would have knocked him out but for Walsh hanging on.

WOLGAST CHALLENGED BY BAT NELSON

CHICAGO, Sept. 17.—Stung by charges that he is a "has been," Battling Nelson issued today a flat challenge here to Ad Wolgast for a ten round bout in Milwaukee for a substantial side bet, in addition to the purse.

"Wolgast is the boy I would like best to get into the ring," said Nelson. "I have money that says I am a better man than he is."

MRS. PANKHURST NOT BLUFFED BY DETENTION TALK

PARIS, Sept. 17.—"I have sufficient faith in the open mindedness of the American people to sail for New York as originally intended. I most certainly have no intention of changing my plans."

This was the declaration voiced here today by Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the noted English militant suffragette leader, who is to sail soon for the United States.

"I don't expect to be detained at Ellis Island when I reach New York," added Mrs. Pankhurst, "and I am not afraid of the ordeal, even if I am held."

"The immigration officials cannot deport me; they cannot call me an undesirable. I am not a fugitive, either. I was liberated from Holloway prison under the odious 'cat and mouse' act, but the British authorities did not attempt to prevent me from leaving England."

"I positively will sail October 11. I shall use no subterfuges, and will travel under my right name. I do not advocate militancy in America. I shall preach the gospel of suffragism, particularly its relation to sex hygiene and white slavery."
