CARTRIDGES EXPLODE WHEN ARMORY BURNS

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Sept. 20.—The Rev. Father Brady was shot through the head and bullets shrieked about the ears of a thousand citizens when several thousand cartridges stored in the National Guard armory, a wing of the municipal pavilion, exploded during a fire early today that destroyed the pavilion.

Police cleared the streets for blocks about the pavilion, which burned to the ground while firemen stood outside the range of the bombardment. The damage was about \$50,000.

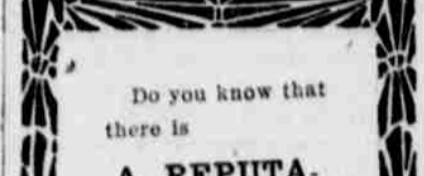

One of the most enjoyable artistic and successful musical recitals ever given in Medford was the concert given by the Medford Conservatory for music and languages last Thursday at the high school. The audience which filled every seat in the auditorium showed by its sympathetic attention and discriminating applause that it was representing the true music lovers of Medford. The artists participating in the concert were Mrs. Ed Andrews, soprano, well known to Medford audiences, Mr. Carlton James, violinist, one of the latest acquisitions to the conservatory, and Mrs. Gerad Taillandier, the director. Mrs. Andrews again demonstrated her ability to artistically interpret not only operatic arias, but simple folk songs as well. Her selections included well known Scotch ballads, a negro melody by Clousam, songs by Nevin, a coloratura aria from the opera Dinorah and a scene from Puccini's Madame Butterfly. The latter was admirably sung in true operatic style and abandon. The difficult Shadow Song by Meyerbeer was faultlessly executed; Mrs. Andrews' true intonation and splendid breath control made her voice distinctly audible, even in pianissimo, in the remotest part of the hall. Mr. Taillandier, already well known as a successful teacher, proved that he is a superior concert pianist. In his selections, embracing compositions of the most various types, such as Raff's Fleusce, Liszt's Rigoletto, Chopin's Berceuse and Voprich's Staccato Caprice, he displayed not only a finished technique but also a remarkable delicacy of touch. The smoothness and evenness of runs in rapid passages and the beauty of his interpretation in general proved him to be a really fine pianist. Mr. James, the violinist, shared the honors with the rest, showing himself to be an artist in temperament and execution. A Beethoven Sonata, a Wieniawski concerto and several minor compositions were equally well rendered. As an encore Mr. James played Raff's Cavatina without piano accompaniment. The entire program afforded by its excellent arrangement of contrasting pieces a source of true enjoyment to every one present. Nor must we forget to mention the accompaniments so well played by Mrs. James for her husband. An elaborate banquet was given the out-of-town physicians attending the medical convention by the local association Thursday evening at Hotel Medford. A committee from the Greater Medford club consisting of Mesdames Harmon, Gore, Schieffelin, Reddy, Merrick and Munday were in charge of the decorations, which were very beautiful.
