GIRL WITNESSES MISSING—FULLER UNDER ARREST

Charged with contributing to the delinquency of two young girls, in which their disappearance on the eve of a grand jury session, when they were to testify against J. B. Titus and Dave Boggs, Medford men, alleged to have deceived them to Ashland a month ago, is involved, A. G. Fuller, proprietor of a Grants Pass garage, was arrested Saturday. Fuller formerly ran a garage in this city. The two girls are Myrtle Hauscom, aged 15, step-daughter of Mike Spanos, under death sentence for murder, and Beatrice Kavanaugh, aged 14. Fuller is held in the county jail and will be given a preliminary hearing this afternoon. The two girls in the case disappeared last Thursday, and it is alleged that Fuller took them for an automobile ride, and they failed to return. According to their parents they had no money when they left. The prosecuting attorney has trailed them as far as Cottage Grove, where they are known to have had \$30 for expenses. Where they got this money is what the authorities would like to know, alleging that there are grounds for belief that grand jury witnesses have been tampered with. The girls will be brought back when located. Titus and Boggs, held to the grand jury, are alleged to have taken the girls to Ashland and were about to quarter them in a rooming house when arrested by the chief of police of that city. One of the girls was garbed in a dress belonging to the wife of one of the men, to give an appearance of age. The case is alleged to have many interesting sidelights which will be brought out at the hearing.

BREAK GROUND FOR \$35,000 CLUB HOUSE FOR ELKS

Ground was broken this morning for the corner stone for the Elks' club building on North Central avenue between Fifth and Sixth streets. The move was not authorized by the building committee, some Elks, eager for the first honor, having dug the hole. When the cornerstone laying ceremonies are held the name of the "Bill" will come out. The proposed building will cost \$35,000, be 85 feet square, two stories high with basement, and have a fifteen-foot terrace park about it. There will be two floors. The lower will be devoted exclusively for club and social purposes, billiard tables and amusements. The upper floors will be devoted entirely to social and lodge purposes, with a fine ballroom. More floor space will be devoted for social purposes than in any other Elks building in Oregon. There will be other Elks building in Oregon. The building committee are still working on the final details, which will be announced in a short time.

KELLY APPEALS SALOON CASES

Prosecuting Attorney Kelly has taken an appeal from the decision of Circuit Judge Calkins in the Medford liquor cases, in which the ruling was made that the proprietors of saloons could not be held responsible for the acts of their employes in selling liquor to minors. This case was one of the side issues of the charges against Councillman Millar last winter, and concerns practically every saloon in the city. "The appeal was taken," said Prosecutor Kelly "in accordance with the stipulation made by attorneys of prosecutions and defense before Judge Calkins, in which it was agreed to carry the matter to the supreme court for a ruling on the subject."
