SEEK TESTIMONY OF WOUNDED WOMAN AGAINST COULSON

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 22.—If the hospital authorities will permit, Coroner Leland decided today to secure the testimony of A. B. Coulson's common-law wife in affidavit form and to hold an inquest on William Acker and George Kovack tomorrow night.

The woman, who was badly wounded at the same time Acker and Kovack were shot to death, while lurching together at the Atlas garage last Thursday night, was considered out of danger today, but it was said she could not leave the hospital for some time.

Coulson, still held without a formal charge, was beginning to grow very impatient, and urged his lawyer, Attorney Lipman, to hurry things as much as possible. Through interviewed daily by detectives, he has made no statement of the slightest value bearing on the shooting.

Mrs. Mary Stafford, who was with the party which made the rounds of the beach resorts just before the tragedy, has been released on her promise to testify when wanted. The police said they did not believe her testimony would be of much value, as they are sure she knows nothing about the shooting.

Mrs. Kovack, wife of one of the victims, has become temporarily insane from grief and friends are caring for her and her two children.

SERIOUS STRIKE RIOTS FEARED IN CALUMET DISTRICT

CALUMET, Mich., Sept. 22.—Serious clashes between striking copper miners and the militia, police and mine guards were feared here today as a result of the injunctions issued Saturday, night prohibiting picketing, the molestation of men going to and coming from work in the mines and parades in the vicinity of the mine owners' property.

Speakers for the Western Federation of Miners urged the Red Jacket miners at a meeting yesterday to ignore the injunction, declaring it an interference with personal liberty, public assemblage and free speech.

Strike leaders will hold a meeting tomorrow to consider the best attitude to adopt in the injunction. President Moyer of the federation has gone to Chicago, presumably to consult Attorney Clarence S. Barrow concerning this point.

STRONG PRICES FOR LIVESTOCK

PORTLAND, Sept. 22.—Receipts for the week have been cattle, 1640; calves 62; hogs 2337; sheep 6462. The late cattle market manifested little if any change as receipts since the first of the week have been very meagre and business very slow.

The swine market was unsatisfactory from several view points. Total receipts were comparatively small, quantity not of the best and demand slow. Prices generally 15 to 20 cents lower. Best light hogs selling \$8.50 to \$8.75. Trade spasmodic and a hand to hand proposition.

The one real bright spot in the stock trade last week was a sharp advance in the ewe division of the sheep house. Prices are from 25 to 50 cents higher and choice killing stock is selling \$4.25 to \$4.40. Wethers were not offering and a few poor lambs failed to create any sensation, but these classes are doubtless stronger. The exact price range will be determined when some choice stuff is liquidated.
