PERVERTING THE LAW

UNITED STATES JUDGE POLLOCK of Kansas has handed down a ruling in the case of Lee Baker, charged with violation of the Mann white slave law...

"The Mann act was not meant to prevent personal escapades of men and women. It refers only to the transportation of girls for commercial purposes," asserts Judge Pollock.

In the Diggs-Caminetti cases Judge Van Fleet ruled that the defendants were punishable under the terms of the Mann act, although the prosecution admitted that the defendants did not take the girls out of the state for commercial purposes.

The Mann act was intended to suppress the traffic in young women for immoral purposes; in other words, the commercialization of immorality.

It was a perversion and prostitution of the law to punish as white slave men who, whatever their shortcomings, were not white-slavers.

The Diggs-Caminetti cases belonged in state courts, where abundant statutes exist against such crimes as those charged, and not in the federal courts, but to make a grand stand political play for a four-flusher, the federal courts are prostituted.

Judge Pollock has taken the common-sense view of the case, and his position will probably be sustained by the supreme court, and the defendants escape punishment altogether by a reversal.

The Diggs-Caminetti case, being an abuse of a meritorious law, will thus be the means of discrediting the law, defeating justice and permitting culprits to escape punishment—all for a little cheap politics.
