ASHLAND TROLLEY FRANCHISE FORFEITED

ASHLAND, Sept. 23.—By proclamation of Mayor Johnson the ordinance granting a street railway franchise in Ashland became effective February 24th.

At midnight August 23rd it was six months since the ordinance became effective. M. T. Minney or his assigns had till then to designate the streets on which they would do business in Ashland. Failing to do so they lost the right to select streets—having failed to comply, etc. The ordinance specifies that their \$1000 check shall be forfeited at the expiration of eight months if they have not begun actual construction work. The check is, however, practically forfeited—as there can, obviously, be no construction work started since they failed to select streets. Ashland's trolley line is, therefore, a dead issue.

Baking Helps

Learn to Regulate the Heat of Your Oven

There is just one way to make your cakes rise high and keep an even surface. Have your oven moderate at first, until the cake is fully risen; then increase the heat, so as to brown it over quickly. Extreme heat stiffens the dough. If you stiffen the outside of the cake before the rising is complete, you stop the rising process. Then the leavening gas, forming inside, will bulge up the center, where the dough is still soft, and spoil the shape of the cake.

NOTE—Biscuits or other pastries made from stiff dough, that are cut into shapes for the oven, bake in a hot oven. This is because the cut surfaces of the dough do not seal over, but rather leave the cores open, allowing the leavening gas to escape and the heat to penetrate readily. Small ovens cool quickly; therefore they should be made several degrees hotter than a larger oven, and the less the door is opened the better. Do not attempt to bake bread and pastries together. Bread requires prolonged, moderate baking—pastry the reverse.

Have a strong underheat for baking powder preparations, especially pastry.
