

### FARMERS FAVOR REAL RURAL CREDITS

PLANO, Ill., Sept. 26.—District of the rural credit system being advocated unless it conforms absolutely to the currency measure advocated by President Wilson in the Owens-Glass measure, was expressed here today by delegates to the Farmers' National Congress which is holding its thirty-third annual convention here. The congress adjourns this afternoon. This year's convention has been the largest attended and most important in the history of the organization. Governor Dunne of Illinois, headed a delegation of 1,000 farmers commissioned from that state. Ohio sent eight hundred farmers headed by Governor Cox. Governor Clark of Iowa commissioned five hundred from the Hawkeye state. Maryland is represented by 200 farmers; Wisconsin by 600; Minnesota by 400 and Indiana, Missouri, Trans-Missouri and southern states are represented by many hundreds of farmers.

The establishment of a bureau of markets in the department of agriculture, and a real rural credit system which will completely divorce Wall street from its dominance of finances in the United States were the two most important subjects considered at the congress. Speakers today demanded that congress give them a rural credit system which will really relieve them of approximately one-half of their present interest burden which amounts today to nearly \$600,000,000 annually. The dominance by Wall street of the money market, declared speakers, has been the sole cause of high rural credits which they claimed will be reduced to normal and equitable rates only if the Owens-Glass currency measure is made a law.

### CLATSOP TO VOTE ON \$400,000 ROAD BONDS

ASTORIA, Ore., Sept. 26.—The progressive citizens of Clatsop county, not to be outdone by others in the lower Columbia river section, are now agitating the question of voting on a \$400,000 bond issue for good roads at the November election. The principal object in the move is to assist the Columbia highway association in establishing the proposed highway from Portland to the sea via Astoria.

To construct the highway through Clatsop county it is necessary to issue bonds to raise the required funds, and petitions are now being circulated throughout the county to put the question on the ballot. The petitions must be filed by October 1, otherwise the election will be illegal.

The plan of those behind the movement is to issue a series of 20-year bonds, which will draw 6 per cent interest. The first series is to be for \$100,000, and will be placed under the direction of the Clatsop county court, while the actual construction work will be under the supervision of the state highway commission.

### MULTNOMAH GIVES SURVEY TO BOWLBY

PORTLAND, Sept. 26.—That Multnomah county may do its share in making possible a uniform highway system from The Dalles to the Pacific ocean, a resolution was passed by the county commissioners this morning authorizing the Oregon state highway commission to assume control of that portion of the Columbia river highway from Portland to the east boundary of Multnomah county. According to the resolution only the surveys, locations and necessary preliminary work is to be done by the commission.

In order that the commission may carry out the work, authority to draw on the \$75,000 fund set aside for the construction of the highway was given in the resolution. This latter authority is subject to further orders of the county commissioners.

"We desire to join in the movement for a uniform highway," said Commissioner Helman this morning. "The county will not turn over the entire work of constructing the highway to the state, but will give the commission opportunity to carry out plans for a great highway. I expect the commission will employ Samuel Lancaster, now county expert in charge of the work, in a similar capacity."

### TACOMA ENFORCES ABATEMENT LAW

TACOMA, Wash., Sept. 26.—Following the issuance of an information charging violation of the so-called lowa red light abatement law recently passed, against Hugh C. Wallace, former member of the national democratic executive committee and President Wilson's confidential adviser in this state, owner of the Antlers Hotel, which was raided by the police as an immoral resort Wednesday. Forbes P. Haskell, Jr., secretary of the Northern Coast company appeared before Prosecuting Attorney Dow today and announced that the defendant would be ready for trial when the case was set. Wallace is president of the Northern Coast company.

Working in conjunction with the sheriff's deputies and the local police, the prosecuting attorney is gathering evidence against several other hotels where it is alleged men and women meet. Affidavits of police officers are in the possession of the prosecuting attorney's office in which statements are made that the women taken from the Antlers Hotel during the raid are disorderly persons.

### BOWLBY IN CHARGE HOOD COUNTY WORK

SALEM, Or., Sept. 26.—H. L. Bowlby, state highway engineer, was notified today by G. R. Castner, county judge of Hood River county, that the county court authorizes him to start work at once surveying a route for the Columbia river highway through that county. Judge Castner says the court, at a meeting next week, will formally authorize the expenditure of the money necessary for the survey, which will be about \$4000.

Wasco county several weeks ago asked the highway engineer to make a survey for the road through that county, and he will do similar work for Multnomah county. Mr. Bowlby will start three surveying parties to work at once.

### LOCATE NEW ROAD OVER CALAPOOIAS

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Sept. 26.—Residents of London have hired surveyors to locate a road from Black Butte to Satherlin, crossing the Calapoopia range at a point where the headwaters of the coast fork and of Coon creek nearly meet and where there is said to a low pass.

The object of the survey is to get the Pacific highway changed to this course, which is said to be much shorter and capable of better road construction than the present highway through Pass creek canyon. It is said that a water grade can be secured the entire distance.

### OIL TANKER GOES AT PORTA GORDE

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Sept. 26.—Bringing news that the oil tanker Washenaw, towing the oil barge Simla, went ashore at 10 a. m. Wednesday at Rodger's Beach, four miles south of Punta Gorde, California, the steamer Nann Smith arrived here today one day overdue with the Simla in tow.

Both boats were floated and neither was badly damaged.

The first news that Captain Magee of the Nann Smith had heard of the grounding was when he intercepted a wireless call for assistance, and hurried to the rescue. The steamer Adelina Smith, southbound, also came to the aid of the boats.

In the meantime the tanker had pumped out the oil and managed to get off the sand without assistance, but was leaking so badly she could not help the barge.

These prices already secured are from \$1.00 to \$1.35 per box higher than would have been secured if the cold storage plant had not been in operation and the pears had been forced

into the market at an inopportune time.
