

TOM MARSHALL HONORED BY PEOPLE OF HIS HOME CITY

It is said that a prophet is not without honor save in his own country. Not so a champion marksman. Tom Marshall, who was captain of the American team of marksmen in their world tour in 1901, and who ranks still as a world champion, shooting better as he grows older, is living proof of this assertion.

Mr. Marshall, who is an orchard owner in the Rogue River valley, as well as dean of the Remington-Union Metallic arms of marksmen, arrived Thursday with Charles Thorpe, the famous former jockey, to inspect their local holdings, and is a guest of Edgar Hafer. In his home town of Keithsburg, Ill., they honor him so greatly that they have a Tom Marshall day at the county fair. The Burlington, Ia., Hawk-Eye of September 20 contains the following account of the celebration:

Tom Marshall Day
"Keithsburg, Ill., Sept. 19.—The Mercer County Fair association made no mistake when they dedicated Thursday, September 18, as 'Tom Marshall's day' at the fair. Tom Marshall is known personally, or by reputation, by almost every person in this section. He is an international personage, has been a marked success in political, business and shooting worlds. For two terms he was a member of the Illinois legislature and was mayor of the city of Keithsburg, Ill., his home city, for sixteen years, where he gave satisfaction to all the people all the time. Mr. Marshall built and owned the first telephone lines in western Illinois, connecting up most of the towns and cities. He is now an extensive owner of real estate in and around Keithsburg. In the shooting world he has been especially 'spot-lighted,' being the only man able to twice win the world's championship against all comers, defeating 278 shooters in 1897 and 365 in 1899. He was captain of the all-American team who was sent abroad in 1901, never losing a race, defeating in the international races England, Ireland, Scotland, France, Belgium and Italy.

All Keithsburg Present
"All Keithsburg was present to do honor to 'Our Tom.' They were proud of the many cups and trophies displayed by him at the fair. Two mammoth Tiffany cups were emblematic of the two world's championships. London, England; Dublin, Ireland; Juarez, Mexico; Vancouver, B. C.; Quebec, Toronto, Winnipeg and Niagara on the lake and Canada were the foreign countries from which trophies were exhibited. State, county and city championship cups were in evidence galore.
"Results of his large game hunts in mounted heads were there—buffalo, elk, moose, antelope, deer and mountain sheep. A very large and beautiful specimen of South American tigers killed by Mr. Marshall near Honda, on the Magdalena river, in Columbia, South America, attracted much attention.

Numerous Trophies Shown
"Numerous guns were displayed—Japanese matchlocks, British India blunderbusses, etc. Tom A. Marshall's first guns looked very crude when placed along his two works of art and \$700 each, and both have won honors for their owner. Then the last word in firearms, the Remington autoloading five-shot rifle and shot gun.

"Mr. Marshall also exhibited a priceless line of Indian relics, gathered in his extensive travels. The buckskin shirt of Merry Crow, chief of the Pocatillos, beautifully beaded and decorated with 110 small Indian scalplocks; Chief Standing Bear's war bonnet and armlets; bows and arrows made by Geronimo, demon chief of the Apaches, who recently died at Fort Sill, Okla., and who had been held as a prisoner of war by the United States government since his capture by General Crook. There were Indian axes, mortars and arrow heads, representing the Indian stone ages; beaded work, horsehair lariats, bridles and quilts—in fact, Indian antiques of all kinds and description.

Medal From the Queen
"One souvenir Mr. Marshall displayed with especial pride was a medal presented to him by one of Queen Victoria's bodyguard in Scotland, 'one of the Scotch highlanders.' The medal was originally presented by Queen Victoria to each member of her bodyguard as they passed before the reviewing stand. The medal has upon one side an imprint of the queen as she was crowned; on the reverse side, as she appeared at this jubilee. This aggregation of trophies is unquestionably the largest held by any one man. They are to be presented to the Chi-

cago Athletic association after the fair. It is a great mistake that they are not retained in Mercer county, the home of the man whose prowess with the gun has made possible this collection. Mr. Marshall leaves tonight for a trip to the Pacific coast, Vancouver and Los Angeles, Cal., and will be gone about four weeks.

GLYNN IN CHARGE OF GOVERNORSHIP

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 26.—The tangle in New York state's affairs, due to the dual governorship which for some time preceded the opening of the Sulzer impeachment trial, had been practically straightened out today.

The various departments had all notified Acting Governor Martin Glynn that they recognized his authority. Chester Platt, Governor Sulzer's secretary, had turned over to Glynn a bundle of official mail and offered the acting governor all the assistance in his power.

Glynn has treated Sulzer with all possible consideration, and still declines, with the impeachment case undecided, to take possession of the executive offices.

COST OF LIVING STILL GOING UP SAYS UNCLE SAM

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—Uncle Sam is authority here today for an announcement that the cost of living is increasing, and gives figures and other facts to back the assertion. The report is comprised in a volume issued by the bureau of labor statistics, the facts having been gathered by experts from neighborhood stores in thirty-nine industrial cities since last April. These figures were compared with figures secured by the same bureau from 1890 to 1899, and show the following percentages of increase in prices of products:

Round steak 99.1, sirloin steak 72.6, rib roast 73.4, pork chops 118, bacon 122.9, ham 78.1, lard 66.8, hens 79.2, flour 27.2, cornmeal 55.1, eggs 26.4, butter 61.3, milk 39.2.

The only decline is reported in sugar, which decreased 7.3 per cent. Increases reported from April 15, 1912, to April 15, 1913, follow:

Sirloin steak 17.6, ribs 15.3, bacon 17.2, lard 14.6, butter 8.7, round steak 19, pork chops 17.5, hams 14.7, hens 9.8, milk 4.9.

Flour, potatoes, cornmeal and sugar have declined during the past year, but the prices of anthracite and bituminous coal have increased about 10 per cent.

AVIATOR TUMBLES INTO COOS BAY; UNHURT BY FALL

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 26.—Aviator Ed Steel who Wednesday completed his relay flight from Coos Bay to Toledo by hydroplane fell with his airship into the bay at Toledo from a height of 50 feet when he completed an exhibition flight Thursday. Motor boats rescued Steele from the wreckage practically unhurt. The machine was badly wrecked. Steele says contrary air currents caused the accident.

TROLLEY BUILDERS SHOULD PUT UP INDEMNIFYING BOND

"If the Bullis company think the T rails they propose to lay on Main street are safe, they should have no objection to putting up an indemnifying bond to protect the city against accidents and damages that may result from the use of such rails," says F. Medynski, a large property owner on Main street.

"I saw a woman killed once, just by the use of such rail," continued Mr. Medynski. "The wheel of her buggy caught in the groove worn by the car wheel in the pavement, the horse became frightened and kicked the buggy to pieces, killing the woman."

"In no city that I know of, except perhaps some place where the interests of the city are neglected by civic authorities, do they permit these T rails on the paved streets. In scores of cities, they have compelled the traction companies to replace them with the I or L rail. If no trouble will result, as the builders claim, surely they can have no objection to such a bond."

SULZER ASKED BREWER'S GIFTS BE CASH, NOT CHECKS

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 26.—Several developments marked the impeachment trial of Governor Sulzer today. Jacob H.
