The first year book ever issued by the Greater Medford Club is now off the press and ready for distribution. It is certainly a credit to that organization and compares most favorably with similar books issued by other clubs. The cover is a soft gray with "G. M. C." embossed in blue, and the date in one corner. Just inside this is a cut of the library building, a fitting monument to the energy and zeal of this club through whose efforts it was built. Then follows the club woman's collect, special notices, past presidents, officers and standing committees. Then come the programs of the general club meetings and department meetings. These are not given in most cases, in detail, as it was thought advisable to leave them to be worked out according to the ideas of the department itself.

The treasurer's report shows two interesting facts—the club last year made \$517.50, in addition to which the sale of the Red Cross seals amounted to \$196.75.

The officers of the general and state federations are given, followed by a brief history of the club since its organization in 1903, and a resume of the year's work. The constitution and by-laws, the names of the twenty charter members, together with a list of the present club membership, concludes this neat and attractive little book.

Those who have had experience in issuing anything of the sort know something of the expense. In order to meet it, it has been found necessary to make a charge of thirty cents apiece for the books—the actual cost. They will be ready for distribution at the regular club meeting, Monday afternoon, and after that can be obtained from Miss Robinson at the library any afternoon or evening while they last. Each club member will want one for her own use, and at least one additional copy to send to some friend who doesn't realize that we are really very much alive here in southern Oregon.

Are you using the rest-rooms during the summer, though the rooms were kept open to the public, there was little disposition to use them, but with the cooler weather their value to the community is fully appreciated. During the last ten days they have accommodated something over 150 visitors. An attendant is there daily ready to administer to your needs in any way.
