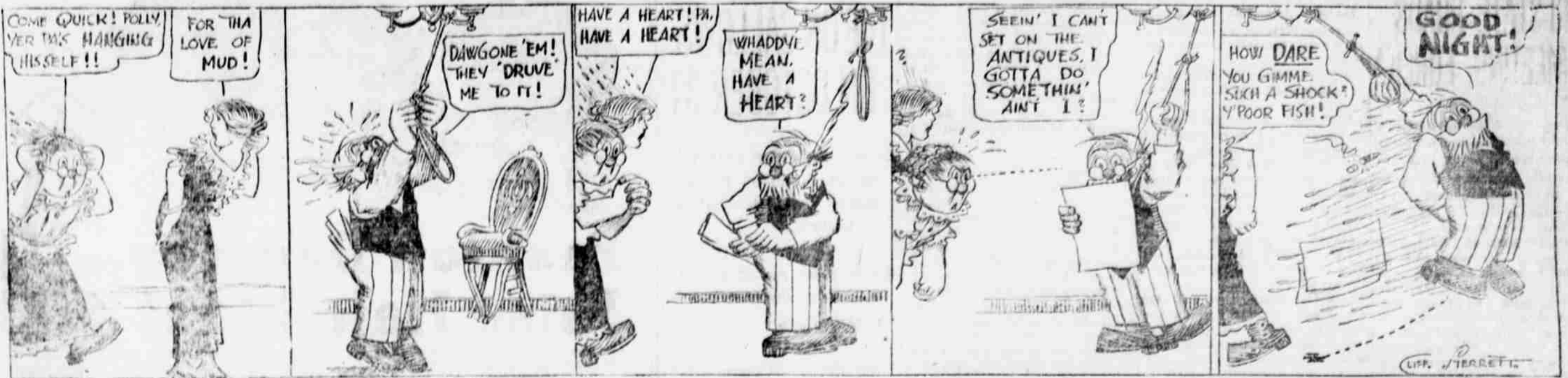

WOMAN WINNER RECALL ELECTION

HANFORD, Cal., Sept. 27.—The friends of Mrs. Nannie E. Davidson, county superintendent of schools, were jubilant today at her victory yesterday in the first recall election ever held on the coast against a woman officeholder. Her opponents maintained that it was simply because many voters did not like to vote their ballots against a woman or objected to the principle of the recall, that she won. The campaign, culminating in a majority of 659 for Mrs. Davidson out of a total vote of 3,000, followed a three-year fight with Principal T. J. Rossman of the Hanford school, which ended recently in the filing of charges of unprofessionalism and immorality against Rossman and the revocation of his certificate by the county board of education.

ROGUE RIVER INDIAN WAR VETERAN DEAD

Judge Richard M. Powers, an Oregon pioneer of 1852 and a veteran of the Rogue River Indian war, died Wednesday at his home in Weston, Ore., at the age of 82 years. Judge Powers was a native of North Carolina. When 21 years old he crossed the plains by ox team and located at Portland, where he followed blacksmithing when that city was a village of 100 people. He afterward resided at Albany, Ore., where he served fourteen years as justice of the peace, and then moved to Lebanon, Ore. He came to Weston in 1879 and was engaged there principally in the practice of law. He was president for several terms of the Umatilla County Pioneers' association, and also one of the earlier residents of the Weston normal school. He is survived by a widow, three sons and one daughter.

TARIFF CONFEREES COMPLETE REPORT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—Democratic tariff conferees plan to complete their report today and hold a final conference Monday with republicans before introducing the report in the house. It is not believed, however, that the measure will be ready for President Wilson's signature before the end of next week. Democratic senators claimed victory in two-thirds of the items over which there were controversies, asserting that most of the lower rates were accepted. The conferees, however, are expected to disagree on the cotton futures tax.
