Potts in my buggy to their home on the Scott Davis farm and there found that Mr. Potts had everything full of fine hay all ready baled and talk about corn, he had some as nice as any one could wish but not equal to the corn on the T. J. Parton place. I also noticed that the fruit in that section seemed to be up-to-date, in fact the trees seemed to be loaded. But I see that I have already reached the space allotted me and have not reached the Agate farm on what used to be called the desert and I will have to defer any mention of what I saw there until some other time.
