AID SOCIETY AGENT

PROBING CONDITIONS

J. Tenseher, Jr., of Portland, traveling agent of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society of Oregon, spent Wednesday in Medford looking after the school's interests in this locality and investigating local cases.

The society rescues homeless, neglected or abused children of Oregon; receives, by legal commitment or otherwise, children from the juvenile courts of this and other counties; provides for such until suitable homes or employment and oversight are found for them, and continues a systematic attention to their condition and treatment.

The society is supported by state and county contributions, from the interest of a bequest fund and voluntary contributions of the public—and both organization and work are non-sectarian. It is always in need of clothing for children from three to eighteen years of age; of books, magazines and supplies of all kinds.

In the past two years the society has received and cared for 945 children. Of this number 392 were new cases, 39 of whom came from Jackson county. In southern Oregon 219 cases have been investigated.

OREGON BULGARIANS

URGE AUTONOMY

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—Cablegrams were sent today to the sovereigns of all the kingdoms of Europe urging, at the instance of the Macedonians and Bulgarians of Oregon, that the policy of the powers be one of autonomy for Macedonia. A telegram to the same effect was sent also to President Wilson. The declaration thus to take a hand in the eastern situation was made last night at a meeting of Bulgarians and Macedonians where two hundred representatives of the two thousand people of those nationalities in Oregon discussed the situation.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—Six months' effort on the part of Mrs. Anne Ginsburg to destroy an affection alleged to have existed between her husband, Phillip Ginsburg, foreman of the Hudson Bay Fur company, and Miss Marie Moselle, an employee of the concern, resulted today in the shooting and killing of Ginsburg by the jealous wife in their room at the Whitehall apartments.
