

REAMES MAKES CORRECTION REPORT OF KEENE CONTEST

To the Editor:

In the issue of your valuable paper of date Wednesday, October 1st, 1913, there appeared an item under Portland date line, relative to the trial of the case of the United States vs. James M. Keene.

This is a suit instituted by the government for the purpose of cancelling a homestead entry. In commenting upon the testimony of the case, the "Tribune" made the following statement:

"While Clarence L. Reames was a private practitioner at Medford, by with his brother, represented Dr. Keene in the same case, both for the defense, however, when the government started litigation against allowing the patent to stand. Consequently, now the United States attorney was thoroughly on the 'inside' of the defense, and he showed this knowledge in his cross-examination of Dr. Keene on the stand."

I regret that your valuable paper which usually reports court proceedings with care, should have made such a misstatement of the facts in this matter. I appreciate that you did not intend to do this and that the fault is undoubtedly with your Portland correspondent. The facts are, however, that the statement appearing in your paper, and above quoted, is untrue and has no foundation whatsoever.

If I had ever at any time or in any manner or in any way appeared for the defendant in the homestead litigation, it would have been manifestly improper for me to have appeared against him in any suit brought by the government to cancel the patent. In such a case, if I had ever appeared as private counsel for the defendant Keene, at any stage of this litigation, I would have called the attention of the attorney general to the matter and he would have directed that special counsel be assigned to try that particular case. I never did appear for the defendant Keene in either this homestead litigation or in any other litigation whatsoever. I was not a partner of Mr. A. E. Reames at the time he appeared in the homestead contest proceedings. My first connection with this case came when I assumed the office of United States attorney and it then became my duty to prosecute the civil case against him on behalf of the government. There is absolutely no basis whatsoever for the statement above quoted.

The same statement was published in the Portland Daily "Journal" on the day of the trial and I immediately called the attention of the managing editor to the error. You will note that on the following day (Oct. 1st), the "Journal" printed a retraction of the statement; and, under the circumstances, I feel that in justice to all parties concerned, namely, Dr. Keene, Mr. A. E. Reames and to myself, you should give this explanation from me the same prominence and publicity as you did the statement of the trial. As I intimated at the outset of this letter, your valuable paper makes very few mistakes but once in a while the best of newspapers are mistaken.

SELLING HUMAN CORPSES \$1.20 EACH TO STUDENTS

BUDAPEST, Oct. 3.—A sensation has been caused here by the formal charge today that the employees of the morgue, have been selling human corpses for \$1.20 each to medical students for "scientific purposes." When Fran Franziska Voros went to the morgue to claim the body of her mother who had died suddenly, she was advised that it had been sold to the Anatomical Institute of the University of Budapest. Upon going there, the body was refused her until she refunded \$1.20 paid to the morgue. When the body was sent to her home for burial, Frau Voros was horrified to find that the supposed body of her mother was the corpse of a man.

Investigation showed that the Anatomical Institute had "made a mistake" and sent the wrong corpse. An official investigation was started today.

BURGLARS RAID NEIDERMEYER HOME

The burglars entered the upper story of the building from an outside stairway and ransacked the whole upper story without arousing any of the inmates.

Mr. Neidermeyer lives one mile north of Jacksonville and believes the robbery was committed by legal talent who are familiar with the arrangement of his house. Two fierce watch dogs gave no alarm and it is believed the robbers were sufficiently familiar with the dogs to quiet them. The only other clue left by the robbers was a package of brown cigarette papers found in one of the rooms.

DAVIS BROUGHT TO INDIANAPOLIS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 3.—George E. Davis, the confessed dynamiter who charges officials of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers with complicity in a campaign of destruction against non-union buildings and bridges, arrived here today from New York.

In charge of him was United States Marshal Joseph Kund and with them was United States District Attorney Charles W. Miller of Indianapolis, who, on account of his familiarity with the dynamite cases here, has been in New York helping to take Davis' confession. Davis was lodged in the same room in the federal building that Oetie McManigal occupied and will await the meeting of the November grand jury here.

Harry Jones, secretary-treasurer of the Ironworkers, who was arrested on the strength of Davis' accusations, had resumed his duties today, under bond. He was expected to waive preliminary examination when his case comes up October 13. He would not discuss his arrest.

Prosecutor Miller, on his arrival, bitterly denounced the Ironworkers' Union for continuing the salaries of President Frank M. Ryan and other convicted officials of the organization, despite the fact that they were found guilty in the dynamite trial here last winter.

VOLIVA PLANS TO CONQUER WORLD FOR ZIONISTS FAITH
