

FEDERALS CAPTURE SANTA ROSALIA

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 4.—The capture of Santa Rosalia, Mex., by government troops from the rebel forces under General Pancho Villa is reported here today in a telegram received by Guillermo Porras, a sympathizer of the Huerta government, from General Mercado, military commander of Chihuahua. Four thousand troops on each side, the telegram said, were engaged in a terrific battle of four hours, the rebels retreating to the south. No estimate of the number of dead and wounded was given. General Castro commanded the victorious federals.

JOCKEY DILLON SENT BACK WITH ACTRESS

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—Bernard Dillon, the jockey, and Marie Lloyd, the actress, who arrived here recently, traveling as Mr. and Mrs. Dillon, and were detained by the immigration authorities on the ground that their relations made them undesirable immigrants, sailed back toward England on the Olympic today. The Washington authorities, overruling local officials, had notified Miss Lloyd, who came here professionally, that she might land under bond. In the meantime, however, the actress had decided she preferred not to stay. Her tour was confined to a single dinner in the city last night.

KAISER DISPLEASED AT CROY ENGAGEMENT

BERLIN, Oct. 4.—That the kaiser is displeased at the news of the duke of Croy's engagement to Miss Nancy Leibmann was the interpretation put today on his majesty's failure to grant a farwelled audience to Miss Leibmann's father, the retiring American ambassador here, the Leibmanns left Berlin this afternoon.

SAY GOVERNOR SULZER QUARRELED WITH LAWYERS

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 4.—Rumors that Governor Sulzer and his counsel were at the parting of the ways was denied tonight by D. Casey Herrick, chief of staff. Herrick broke the silence only after the story had gone broadcast that several attorneys would withdraw from the case Monday. "No truth in the story," said Herrick. "He may be having trouble with the other attorneys with whom he is reported to have counseled but not with those who have appeared in court for him." It was a quiet day for both Sulzer and his attorneys. The governor went motoring. How long the defense will last no one can guess. Subpoenas were issued for 50 witnesses.

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—Government investigation of fake reports of ocean disasters is to be asked by the White Star steamship line, according to plans of that company's officials today.

On two successive days baseless rumors of sinking of two of their vessels were circulated here. Yesterday a rumor had the Oceanic sunk off Plymouth. Then today followed the story that the Baltic had sunk. Officials declared both reports without foundation.

IRON HAND TO RULE CALUMET DISTRICT

CALUMET, Mich., Oct. 4.—General Abbey, commanding the militia in the strike-bound mining district about here, announced today that he meant to rule with an "iron hand." He has established what is practically martial law. Forty men are held in the bullpen.

PARIS, Oct. 4.—The minister of commerce told his fellow cabinet members today that the commission which has been investigating the wisdom of sending a French exhibit to the San Francisco exposition has returned a favorable report.

CHINESE BRIGANDS TORTURE AMERICAN CHILD

PEKING, Oct. 4.—No further news reached the United States legation today concerning the situation at Tsao Yang, where an American child was killed yesterday and foreigners are reported to have been subjected to maltreatment by Chinese brigands. The legation does not know the amount of ransom the brigands want for the release of the American and Norwegian missionaries in their hands or the details of a plan of the missionaries at Fan Cheng and Siang Yang Fu, province of Hupeh to rescue the captives. Advice from Hankow says the brigands at Tsao Yang number two thousand.
