

PURDIN ELECTED MAYOR; QUALIFIES NEXT TUESDAY

At a special meeting of the city council held Friday night, Mahlon Purdin, pioneer resident of Medford, and well known in political circles, was named successor of the chair left vacant by the death of the late W. W. Eifert.

Judge Purdin received five votes and J. A. Perry one. The action of the council came as a surprise, it being generally understood the appointment would be made at the regular meeting Tuesday night.

Before naming Judge Purdin the council held a conference with him earlier in the week, and he agreed to take the place.

Judge Purdin has been a resident of Medford for over twenty years and has served as mayor before, holding the job in 1890. He has also been city attorney, justice of the peace and postmaster.

The oath of office will be administered to the new mayor at the regular meeting Tuesday, and he will assume the duties of his office at once thereafter.

STATE HORTICULTURAL MEET DECEMBER 10

At a meeting just held by the executive committee of the Oregon State Horticultural society, the date of the 28th annual meeting was fixed for Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, December 10th to 12th, at the same time as the Pacific International Live Stock Exposition, so that parties attending can have the advantage of both meetings.

A meeting of special interest has been prepared not only for the apple grower, but for the grower of prunes and other fruits.

Special attention will be given to standardization and by-products.

Among the many interesting papers for apple growers will be those on steamer transportation through the Panama canal and the effect on the horticultural interests of the Pacific coast. Foreign Markets, in which will be given the data secured by Hon. H. B. Miller as chairman of the committee on foreign markets through the U. S. consuls, covering not only green fruits, but giving special reference to dried fruits and by-products as used in foreign countries, and how they should be put up to meet the conditions of the trade.

Of general interest to growers of all kinds of fruits will be the papers and discussions on Co-operative Canners and by-products of fruits; fertilizers and transportation. The Loganberry will receive prominence in a special article on Loganberry by-products, evaporation and juice, and will also receive its proper handling in the cannery and by-products articles.

MACKMEN AND GIANTS PLAY FINAL GAMES

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—Games here and at Philadelphia this afternoon will furnish the Giants and Athletics their last workouts before the world's series which opens here next Tuesday. The season in the east closes this afternoon and that in the west tomorrow.

The Giants and the Philadelphia Nationals met in a doubleheader this afternoon. The Giants worked their regular men in the game and won 12 to 7. Recruits and utility men worked in the second game, Manager McGraw wishing to give the regulars a rest before the championship games start.

Chief interest this afternoon centered in the Giants' stickwork. The regulars have been swatting the ball hard for several days and if they keep it up New York fans cannot see how they are going to lose the world's championship. They figure that the Giant pitchers are far superior to those of the Athletics.

DAVIS LIVES ON FAT AND DRAWS SALARY

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 4.—George E. Davis, who, arrested in New York, in a detailed confession revealed alleged plots to dynamite non-union work, implicating members of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers, is in confinement here today, but held in luxurious quarters, being entertained by detectives of the National Erectors' association. His meals are brought to him from a restaurant. Pending his appearance in court, he is paid \$5 a day by the Erectors, part of which he sends to his wife in New York.

It is expected the federal authorities will grant Davis immunity for the testimony he can give when Harry Jones, secretary-treasurer of the Ironworkers' organization, now under arrest, is brought to trial.

"MOVIES" FREE ROBBER SUSPECT; FACE ON FILM

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 4.—Fred Brokaw, the young man arrested here twelve days ago on the suspicion that he was implicated in a series of murderous attacks and robberies in various eastern cities, was released today on his own recognizance.

His appearance tallied with the descriptions scattered broadcast by

the police in the east, but in each case he was able to produce a convincing alibi. One of the clearest of them was the discovery of his picture on a "movie" film taken here the day of a Pittsburg assault and robbery which was the specific crime charged against him when arrested.

Brokaw left prison declaring he was going to sue his accusers for false imprisonment.

CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—Edward G. Spencer, a railroad man and a former dancing teacher, was arrested and examined at an outlying police station today in connection with the murder here recently of Mrs. Mildred Allison-Rexroat.

WIFE REJOICES AT DEATH OF SPOUSE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 4.—"Ivy is dead and he deserved it. I don't care what they do with me." These were the words today of Mrs. Edith M. Ivy, when told of the death of her divorced husband, Frank M. Ivy, whom she shot and fatally wounded Tuesday.

"Penitentiary or death sentence makes no difference to me," she continued. "He abused my daughter, and I shot him. I have no regrets. Whenever I told my story to the

officials they would send me somewhere else. All I asked was justice. I had past knowledge of my own experience as the wife of Ivy.

"My daughter was taken from me and placed in Whittier Reform school, Ivy got her. When I learned of the abuse by her father, I sought justice in vain."

A coroner's inquest will be held on the body of Ivy Monday. According to the police, a murder charge will be placed against the woman.
