TO BE CONSTITUTIONAL PRESIDENT OF CHINA

Yuan Shih-kai will be elected constitutional President of the Republic of China, and will be formally inaugurated on October 13, the anniversary of the outbreak of the revolution at Wuchang. If an agreement reached between the Provisional President and the leaders of the Parliament is not broken in the meantime.

MURDERER KILLED FOURTEEN

(Continued from Page 1) Spencer then reiterated the details of the murders he says he has committed. He showed no remorse, but gloated over the fact that most of his victims were women.

"Women always have tried to play me for a sucker," Spencer shrieked. "But they always got left, and in each case paid for it with their lives. They are no better than flies, God, how I hate 'em!"

Chief of Police McWeeny believes that Spencer murdered at least four of the persons mentioned in his confession.

Other Murders Admitted

"We have the goods on Spencer in the Rexroat case," said McWeeny. "I also questioned him in regard to the murders of Patrolmen Pennell and Divine twelve years ago. I knew the case well and Spencer gave sufficient details to convince me that he is telling the truth. I am also certain that he murdered a Mrs. Thompson here. He furnished me with details in this case that were never printed in the newspapers.

"Some of the other stories possibly are 'hop yarns,' but I am positive he is implicated in four murders."

Following is a list of killings Spencer says he is responsible for, in addition to the Rexroat murder: One man and a woman, about fourteen years ago.

First wife, killed near West Point, N. Y. Patrolmen Pennell and Divine of Chicago, killed twelve years ago.

Two girls at Paw Paw Lake, Mich., last August. One girl at Lake Delavan, Wis., last summer.

One woman at Belle Island, Mich., last summer. One man shot and killed in Chicago this fall.

One woman killed near the Cook county hospital here a few days ago. One woman shot and burned, of the northwest side here, late last summer.

GERMANY GETS FIRST BARTLETT'S

Germany has had a taste of Oregon Bartlett pears and the fruit has struck the right spot. The fruit shipment of Bartlett pears over intended for the German market has reached its destination. It was forwarded by the Northwestern Fruit Exchange from the Rogue River Fruit and Produce Exchange.

A hurried reply from the German receivers to the local shippers said that the shipment, while an experiment, was a success in practically every way. The only exception was that the fruit was packed in full boxes while for such a long distance it should have been packed in half boxes.

Second Car Follows Anticipating the success of the movement to introduce the Bartlett pears into the German Empire, the Northwestern Fruit Exchange soon after the initial shipment, sent a mixed carload of Bose, Anjous, Howells and Comice to that market. The shipment is now on the high seas having left New York last Thursday.

The Bartlett pear has never before been introduced in the German markets because the bulk of the fruit trade of Germany is controlled by a few brokers of Hamburg who were rather conservative and did not intend to try any experiments which might lose for them the shipments of apples which are grown by practically the same parties who are asking them to try the pears.

SONORA IN HANDS OF REBEL CHIEFTAIN

SONORA, Ariz., Oct. 6.—Rebels here today were inclined to take General Carranza's proclamation of himself as president of Mexico, seriously. Messages from Hermosillo, which he announced would be the capital until he takes Mexico City, indicated that he controls practically the whole of the state of Sonora and has adequate resources for making his campaign general throughout Northern Mexico.

According to constitutional authorities, the rebels have also been recapturing the towns which the federals took from them last week to the south of Piedras Negras.
