

APPLE MARKET CAN BE EASILY RUINED BY GROWERS

PORTLAND, Oct. 9.—The apple market today, generally speaking, is in a position where it can be easily ruined. The free offering of supplies to the open markets of the east would undoubtedly cause a sharp reaction in values, from which it would be almost impossible to recover for some time, if at all.

Just at present the apple market is in strong hands. Some of the biggest dealers of the Atlantic seaboard have bought heavily at very high prices recently. Naturally these interests are not going to see the market get away from them and force a loss on their purchases.

Ultimate Position Good The ultimate position of the market is very good. The extreme shortage in the crop at home as well as abroad all tends to force still higher prices, especially for the better varieties or long-keepers.

English Crop Poor The home crop of apples is not so heavy as last year, and is being marketed much more quickly owing to the very poor crop of plums and other stone fruit. In fact home growers are now sending in such varieties as Newtowns, Bramley Seedlings and others which they usually keep till December or January.

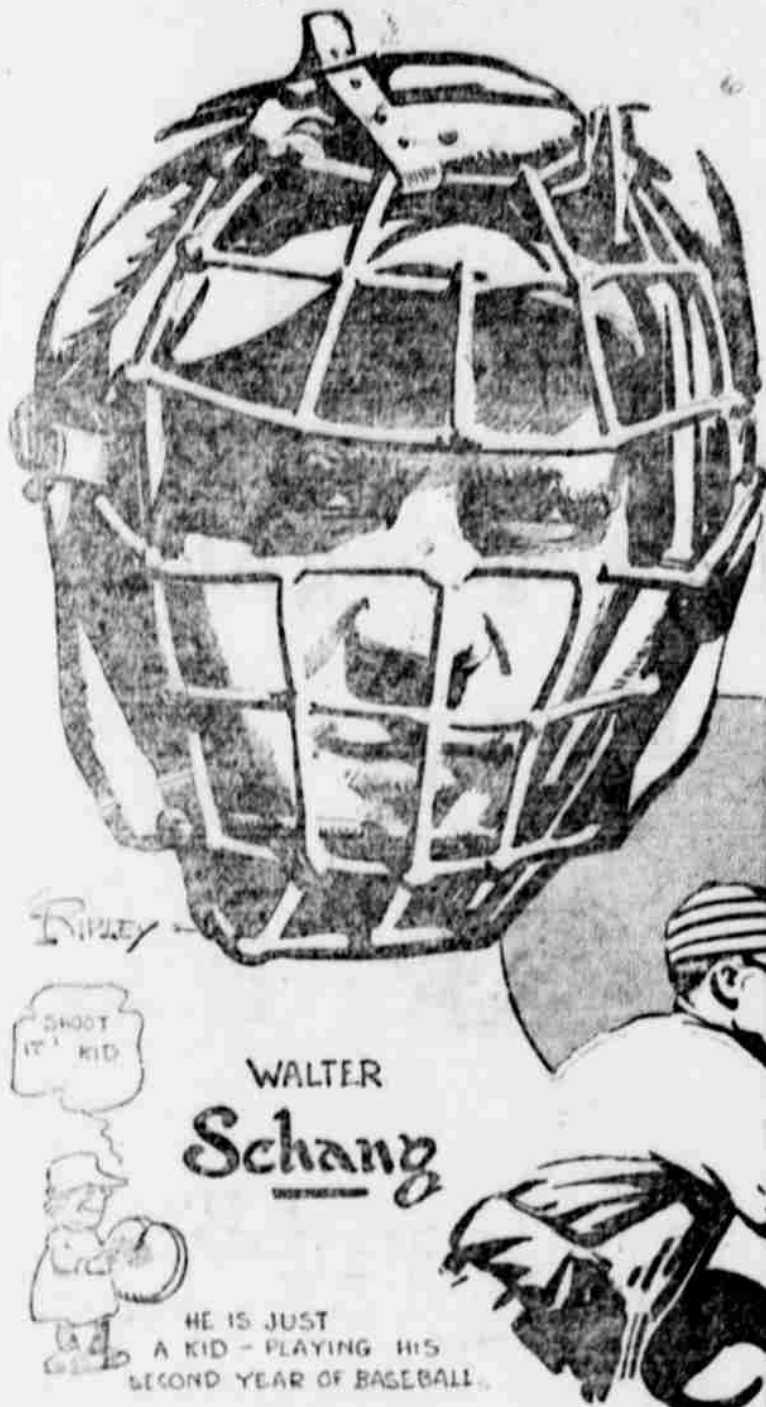

Schang vs. Meyers

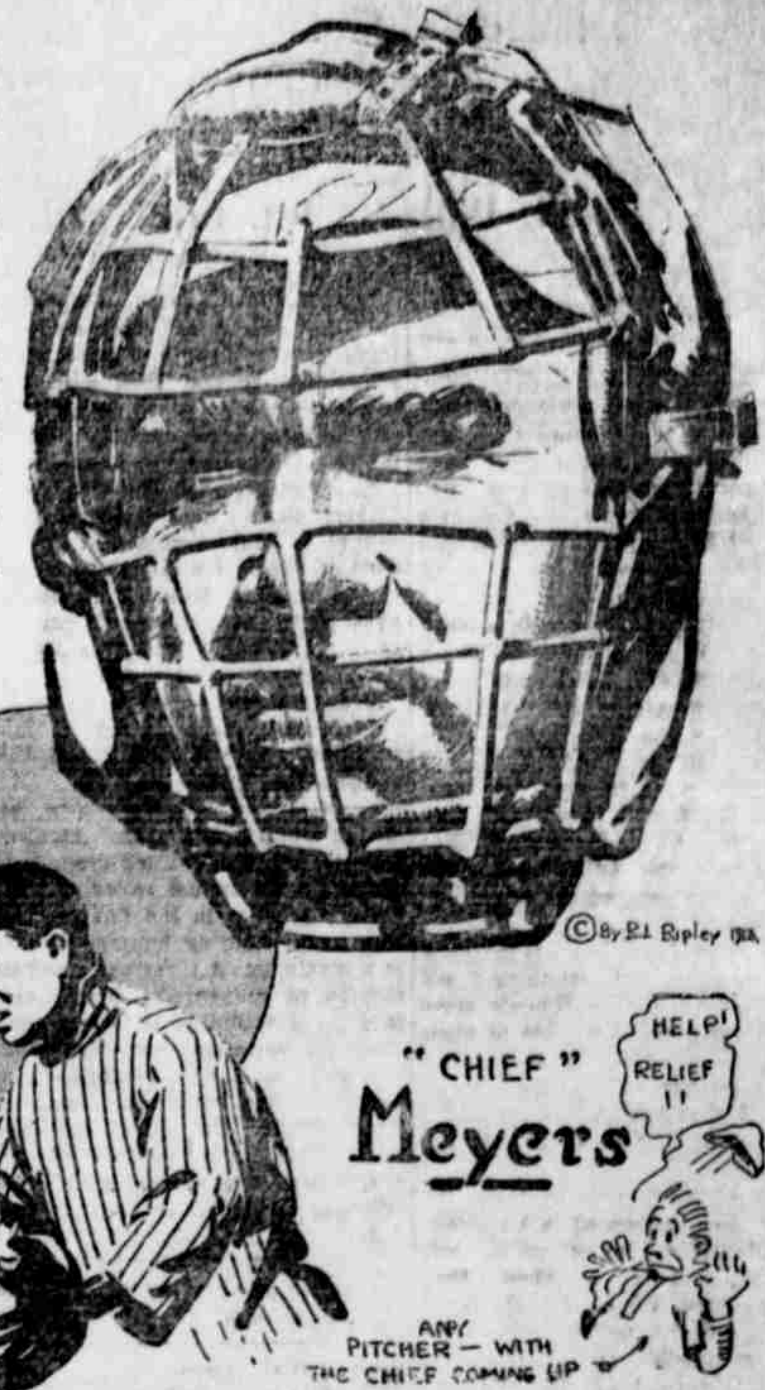
