W. C. T. U. ITEMS. Echoes from the convention at Corvallis was the topic of the W. C. T. U. after the routine business. Here are some that fired the zeal of all the members: The W. C. T. U. work is organized in every state and territory and the world's W. C. T. U. in fifty countries carries on forty lines of work, all tending toward the extinction of the liquor traffic. The production of liquor was reduced in 1912 at the rate of one gallon to every man, woman and child in the United States.

The local unions were told not to be discouraged at doing little work for the state organization could not live, but for the locals. Mrs. Edith Hill Booker, the new state president, in her address pleaded for unity and everlasting warfare against the legalized liquor traffic. She is master of her subject and we are glad to be led by her. One thought her prayers for our work in Oregon would be a great blessing and help to us.
