SULZER REMOVED AS GOVERNOR OF NEW YORK BY VOTE 43 TO 12 SAYS ONLY BEGUN TO FIGHT

Lieutenant-Governor Glynn Sworn In as Successor—Promised Sensational Exposure Fails to Materialize—Sulzer Not Debarred From Office, But Will Seek Democratic Nomination, and Failing, Will Run Independent—Evidence Prevents Deposed Official From Posing as Martyr—Plans to Devote Life to Destroying Tammany's Power in Politics.

HOW SULZER IMPEACHMENT COURT VOTED.
Article 1. That Sulzer filed with the secretary of state a false statement of his campaign contributions. **GUILTY.**
Article 2. That in his statement to the secretary of state, Sulzer committed perjury. **GUILTY.**
Article 3. That Sulzer bribed witnesses to withhold testimony from the legislative committee which investigated his campaign receipts and expenditures. **NOT GUILTY.**
Article 4. That Sulzer suppressed evidence before the investigating committee by threatening witnesses. **GUILTY.**
Article 5. That Sulzer persuaded Broder F. L. Colwell from responding to a subpoena from the investigating committee. **NOT GUILTY.**
Article 6. That Sulzer committed larceny in speculating with contributions to his campaign fund. **NOT GUILTY.**
Article 7. That Sulzer threatened to use his office and influence to control public officials. **NOT GUILTY.**
Article 8. That Sulzer used his official authority and influence corruptly to affect the prices of stocks on the New York exchange because he was personally interested in them. **NOT GUILTY.**
Removed from the governorship but not disqualified from holding office in future.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 17.—Governor Glynn issued a very short formal statement late this afternoon, in which he said that he felt only sadness at succeeding Sulzer, and pledged himself to an honest, progressive administration.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 17.—William Sulzer was removed from the governorship of New York state today. Lieutenant Governor Martin H. Glynn succeeded him.

Secretary of State May swore Glynn into office a few minutes before 1 p. m. He evidently considered the time important for an inaugural address and assumed his new post practically without comment. Sulzer told one of his lawyers, Samuel Thomas, that he had only just begun fighting. Later, he added to a few personal friends that under the circumstances he welcomed the verdict of removal, since the filing of articles of impeachment against him had ruined his usefulness as governor.

Issues No Statement
But he issued no formal statement. He might do so later, it was said. He gave the impression plainly, however, that he would be a candidate for governor at the next election—as the democratic candidate, if the party will have him; independently, if it will not.

Sulzer has suffered severely under the strain of the impeachment trial. His nerves were much shattered today and he had completed plans to go to the Adirondack mountains Sunday night for a short rest. He will be in New York, however, by the first of the following week. ELLIS CONFESSES TO KILLING WIFE

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—William Ellis, member of a wealthy Cincinnati family, confessed this afternoon at a coroner's inquest here that he killed his wife in the Hotel Sherman yesterday by slashing her throat, and then attempted to end his own life. "Yes!" he screamed. "I killed her! I almost cut her head from her body. My God! It was awful I am sorry I didn't die, too." Ellis killed his wife and then telephoned to a friend that a terrible tragedy had occurred in their room. Then he shot himself in the temple, but the bullet did not touch a vital spot. Ellis told the police yesterday that his wife had slashed her own throat after they had entered into a suicide pact. The couple arrived here earlier in the week, coming from Cincinnati to celebrate their tenth wedding anniversary.

TWO AMERICANS SLAIN IN MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 17.—Two Americans, Thomas Barrett, a mine manager, and William Kendall, were slain by Mexicans today at Hostotipaquillo, state of Jalisco, according to dispatches received here. Twenty-five other foreigners, threatened by the same mob, escaped with the aid of rurales, who guarded their departure on a train for Guadalajara. Barrett's skull was split open by a Mexican armed with an axe. Kendall captured the slayer and turned him over to the rurales. On the way to Magdalena the prisoner tried to escape and was killed by the rurales. It was reported that Kendall shot Barrett's slayer, and this caused the mob to kill Kendall. Other foreigners barricaded themselves in the mining camp at Hostotipaquillo, after telephoning Magdalena for aid.

DIRIGIBLE BURNS IN MID-AIR; 28 ON BOARD DIE

Huge Airship Zeppelin "L 2" Explodes Three Hundred Feet Above Johannisthal Field—Only One on Board Escapes—He Will Die Also.

New Craft Built for Navy on Its First Trip—Cause of Explosion Unknown—Three Other Disasters.

BERLIN, Oct. 17.—Zeppelin dirigible "L 2" exploded and burned in mid-air 300 feet above Johannisthal field today. Of 29 persons on board 28 were killed. There was a single survivor. A naval officer, who was so frightfully burned and mangled, however, that he cannot recover. The charred body of the officer who was acting as pilot was found in his cabin, still at the wheel. The Zeppelin was a new craft built for the navy. It was considered the last word in aerial construction of its kind. The trip as was making was its first test. Kaiser Wilhelm was at Boon when informed of the disaster. "It is God's will," he said. "Germany must be strong and bear up courageously. At first the kaiser was overcome, but later he and the empress telegraphed their sympathy to the families of the victims. It is feared the tragedy will paralyze German aerial traffic. The nation is in mourning. It is believed the disaster will have a serious effect on Count Zeppelin's health. The cause of the accident is not known. On the Zeppelin dirigibles the car is hung close up to the bag and connected directly with it. In most American dirigibles, including ours, the car hangs much lower, and the tremendous rush of air between the car and the bag sweeps away the gas which is found so often under the Zeppelin bag. That is the reason more accidents occur in Germany in proportion to the number of flights than in this country. Close on the heels of the news of the disaster to the "L 2," word reached Berlin of three aeroplane accidents in which Captain Haessler, Lieutenant Koch and Sergeant Mante of the military aviation corps were killed.

CALIFORNIA GOES INTO INSURANCE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 17.—Insurance firms operating in California will be dealt a blow January 1, according to all indications today, through the state compensation insurance fund, effective then, which will put California in competition with the regularly organized companies. The industrial act board today sent circular letters to employers throughout the state notifying them that they may insure against all liability with the commission, but cannot insure elsewhere, and come under the operation of the law.

DEMOCRATS DODGE MEXICAN TANGLE; TABOO PEACE PLANS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—President Wilson indicated today that he was irrevocably determined to deal no longer with the Huerta regime in Mexico, but that further steps toward bringing about peace would be considered but just what the Washington government will do is a matter of speculation among high officials, but the trend of events they say is unmistakably toward conducting negotiations with the constitutionalists. That President Wilson believes the Mexico City administration incapable of restoring constitutional authority is evident here and the well founded understanding that the Washington government would adopt a very drastic policy immediately but for fear of interfering with the democratic program of currency and other legislation.

LOW CHURCHMEN WIN VICTORY OVER HIGH CHURCH

NEW YORK CITY, N. Y., Oct. 17.—The low church party won another important victory in the house of deputies today when the Rev. William Grosvenor reported that the prayer book committee was of the opinion that it lacked authority to consider the proposed change in the church's name from the Protestant Episcopal to the American Catholic. The house of bishops went into executive session to consider nominations to six vacancies which will be filled by ballot tomorrow.

EATON'S DAUGHTER TESTIMONY HELPS MOTHER'S CAUSE

PLYMOUTH, Mass., Oct. 17.—Mrs. Jennie May Eaton frequently expressed the belief that her husband, Admiral Joseph G. Eaton was insane, according to the testimony offered at the trial here today by Dorothy Eaton, Mrs. Eaton's crippled daughter. Mrs. Eaton is charged with having murdered the admiral by administering poison. Mrs. Eaton finally secured an attendant for the admiral, Dorothy testified, a woman named Rooney, from Washington. She remained a month. The admiral, according to Dorothy, occasionally got intoxicated and was very boisterous at times. Mrs. Eaton appeared on the verge of a breakdown throughout her daughter's testimony. "Father was a very heavy drinker but mother never drank anything," Dorothy Eaton testified. "Mother said she moved to Assinippi just to see if the change would not benefit the admiral's health and habits. "Often I heard mother accuse him of using drugs. She said she feared he might poison somebody when he was in that condition. Except when the admiral was under the influence of liquor or drugs he and mother were most affectionate. On the night of father's last illness, mother just cried and cried." Dorothy denied that she ever saw Admiral Eaton show fear of her mother.

ABANDON HOPE FOR ENTOMBED MINERS

CARDIFF, Oct. 17.—Hope was abandoned today of finding anyone alive in the universal colliery at Singhenydd. Workers were still trying to reach the party of twenty-nine who, from a blocked-up chamber, were signaling that they were alive long after it was supposed the last living man had been taken from the mine. Their signals had long ceased, however, and it was considered certain that they, too, had died.

CRATER LAKE PERK UNDER STATE CONTROL

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 17.—Attorney General Crawford today held that the Crater Lake National Park is under the police jurisdiction of the state and the state's laws regulating hunting and fishing apply to the park. The department of interior had objected to wardens enforcing these laws in the park.

HUERTA'S WARSHIP IS SENT TO ESCORT FELIX DIAZ BACK

HAVANA, Oct. 17.—Word that a Mexican gunboat was on its way here to take General Felix Diaz from Havana to Vera Cruz was received today. Ostensibly the intention was to pay the general a compliment, but the general impression was that Provisional President Huerta wanted to make it as difficult as possible for Diaz to avoid placing himself in the former's power again. Friends of Diaz have cabled him from Mexico to warn him to stay in Cuba, and he probably will be killed if he returns home.

JUDGE HUMPHREY BACKS FROM INJUNCTION HOLE

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 17.—Judge Humphries this morning, after a conference with Ole Hansen, a prominent citizen of Seattle and Attorney P. V. Davis and Glenn Hoover, the opposing counsel in the suit, signed an order dissolving his injunction against street speaking.

SUES MOTHER-IN-LAW FOR \$500,000 DAMAGES

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—Process servers were watching all trains from the Pacific coast today to serve papers on Mrs. Isabella T. Barton of Alameda, Cal., who is en route to New York in an alienation suit for \$500,000 filed against her by her former son-in-law, Telemon Cuyler of Atlanta, Ga. Cuyler charges that Mrs. Barton is responsible for the divorce her daughter secured recently from him in San Francisco.

YALE IN BAD SHAPE FOR FOOTBALL SEASON

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Oct. 17.—The Yale football squad is in bad shape for their game here tomorrow with Lehigh. It seemed certain today that a team of substitutes would line up against the visitor.

MARCONI INJURED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

PONTECCHIA, Italy, Oct. 17.—William Marconi, inventor of the wireless, who recently lost an eye in an automobile accident, was in another one today between here and Bologna, his car striking a horse as it turned a corner. The inventor, though bruised, was not badly hurt. New York has 525,000 unionists. An occupational disease law is now in effect in Missouri.

SPANOS CLAIMS FREKAS KILLED DEDASKALOUS

Greek Sentenced to Be Hanged and His Partner, Frank Seymour, Make Another Confession to Warden Implicating Greek Section Hand.

Same Charge Was Made Year Ago and Disproved During Trial—No Credence Placed in Accusations.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 17.—Alleging that Tom Frekas was the man who murdered George Dedaskalous in Medford, for which crime they are sentenced to be hanged October 31, Mike Spanos and Frank Seymour, alias Parker, have today given Warden B. K. Lawson of the state penitentiary complete statements of their alleged knowledge of the crime. The statements which were made separately, were taken by Warden Lawson at the request of the condemned men. According to the alleged story, Frekas provoked the trouble between him and Dedaskalous because the latter wouldn't loan him money with which to buy whiskey. They assert that in the ensuing tussle Frekas stabbed Dedaskalous and then beat in his head with a rock or piece of iron. Spanos alleges he witnessed the crime, but, they say, Seymour was not present. When shown the report from Salem to the effect that Mike Spanos and Frank Seymour, alias Parker, had made a confession to Warden Lawson at Salem implicating Tom Frekas with the killing of Dedaskalous for which crime Spanos and Seymour are under sentence of death, District Attorney Kelly stated that the story of Spanos and Seymour was worthy of very little credence. Both Spanos and Seymour were taken over the ground at the time of the first confession and their confession at that time which did not implicate Frekas, was fully borne out and corroborated by all the circumstances. Moreover, the knife wounds inflicted on Dedaskalous were unquestionably inflicted after the murdered man had been rendered unconscious by blows from a bludgeon which was later found in a room occupied by Seymour. Frekas was a witness against the condemned men and this together with the hope of a further respite in the execution of the death sentence is believed by the district attorney to have inspired today's confession from the condemned man.

OFFICIALS ARE RESIGNING

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 17.—Unrest prevailed throughout the city today as a result of continued resignations of Huerta officials. No word was forthcoming from Huerta regarding a report that he intended to resign as provisional president and turn the affairs of the country over to Pedro Lascurain, who was minister of foreign affairs in the late President Madero's cabinet. Representatives of Spain, Germany and France admitted today that the foreign diplomats here were conferring over the situation, but denied that their governments had been asked to send warships to Mexican waters.

DANIELS AT NAVY'S FALL TARGET PRACTICE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels several of his fellow members of the cabinet and a number of members of the senate and the house naval committee left the Washington navy yard today on the President's yacht Mayflower to witness fall target practice by the Atlantic fleet on the southern drill grounds outside the Virginia capes. President Wilson was to have accompanied the party, but was detained in Washington, on account, it was believed, of the Mexican situation. The Mayflower was expected to arrive off the capes tomorrow morning.

LEBANON BAPTISTS TO MEET AT GRANTS PASS NEXT YEAR

LEBANON, Or., Oct. 17.—The Oregon Baptist convention, in session here today, has chosen Grants Pass as its meeting place for next year.

PLOT RUMORED UNEARTHED TO SLAY HUERTA

Guards About Palace Doubled—Diplomats to Be Summoned to Hear Statement From Dictator—Stories of Resignation Current in Mexico.

Officials Resign Office by the Score—No Hope at Washington for an Early Solution of Tangle.

VERA CRUZ, Mex., Oct. 17.—Rumors that a plot to assassinate Provisional President Huerta was discovered in Mexico City last night were in circulation here today. Dispatches from the capital said the guards about the national palace had been doubled, but no details were given. That Huerta has either summoned or was about to summon the diplomatic corps in Mexico City to hear a statement from him tomorrow was positively stated. Many surmised that he planned to tell the diplomats of his decision to resign.

RIFT IN THE WAR CLOUD

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—Hope of an early solution of the tangle in Mexico was abandoned today by government officials here. President Wilson, it is reported, is determined no longer deal with the Huerta administration, but that further steps toward bringing peace to Mexico were being considered. A rift in the clouds came today when it was reported that General Carranza, the rebel leader, is negotiating with General Huerta to secure peace, including a proposition naming Pedro Lascurain provisional president, the restoration of congress and the holding of an early election.
