REPORT OF DR. SUN'S ARREST GROUNDLESS

TOKIO, Oct. 18.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, who was first provisional president of China, and is now a fugitive on account of his connection with the recent uprising against President Yuan Shi Kai, was found at his home here today by a reporter for the news agency Nippon Dempo Tanshin Sha, sent out to investigate reports that he had been arrested in Kobe, charged with embezzlement.

The story was that the doctor was accused of having made away with two million taels, or about \$1,250,000, of the money he raised from Chinese all over the world to finance the revolution. It was said Yuan Shi Kai was trying to secure his extradition to China, where his head unquestionably would be in imminent danger.

The report, however, was wholly baseless. The doctor was not arrested, was not accused of anything probably would not be surrendered by Japan if he were accused, since no one here believes there is the slightest just ground for suspicion against him, and although he is living very quietly, is not even in hiding.

POPE WATCHES SISTER'S RESIDENCE BURNING

ROME, Oct. 18.—With the pope watching in terrible anxiety, from a window in the Vatican, the house occupied by his sisters, near the pontifical residence, burned today. His sisters, however, escaped safely. His holiness gave thanks in his chapel when assured that they were unhurt.
