## SULZER SHOWS MURPHY'S CAPITOL GRAFT

### MILLIONS SPENT WITHOUT AUDIT OR ACCOUNTING

Impeached Governor Tells of Dummy  
Payrolls and Cheap Substitutions  
by State Architect's Office in New  
Building by Murphy's Order.

Incompetent in Office Protected by  
Murphy and Removal Fought by  
Tammany and Frawley.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—The use by the United Press of a second installment of James Creelman's articles dealing with the Sulzer impeachment case was permitted today by the New York Evening Mail. Creelman wrote in the Mail in part as follows:

The charge that Edward E. McCall acted as Charles F. Murphy's messenger does not rest on William Sulzer's word alone.

"McCall came constantly to the executive mansion," says Mrs. Sulzer, "urging the governor to do this or that. He even said to me, 'your husband must do these things or he destroyed; make your husband do them.'"

After Sulzer's revelations yesterday I asked his lawyer, Louis Marshall, why Sulzer did not make these disclosures on the witness stand.

**Evidence Ruled Out**  
"It was attempted at the beginning of the trial," answered Marshall, "but the court would not allow us to go into what it held to be outside matters. The evidence was ruled out."

One incident bearing on the secret authority assumed by Murphy over the state government I omitted from yesterday's account. Sulzer had prepared a statement reciting all the incidents, just as he would have told them on the witness stand.

This one reads:  
"After I took office in January I learned that the state architect had expended more than \$1,300,000 during the previous year practically upon his own certificate and that there had not been a proper audit. I learned also that the 1912 appropriation for the capitol had been exceeded by nearly \$500,000 without proper supervision."

**Architect's Graft**  
"I asked a committee representing the American Institute of Architects to investigate and I also asked John Hennessy, my special graft investigator, to dig into some of the accounts presented for payment."

"The architects reported that State Architect Hoefer and Deputy Powers were not by training, experience or ability competent to fulfill their duties."

"Hennessy found several questionable items."

### SWINDLER IN ROLE OF A DIPLOMAT

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 21.—Dr. J. Grant Lyman, on trial in the federal court here charged with using the mails to defraud, in connection with the defunct Panama Development company, was shown in the role of a diplomat, today.

Prosecutor Edward A. Rengan introduced evidence showing that Lyman approached officials of the Panama government and represented to them that he would be a big figure in the future of Panama, thus securing the consent of the officials to place their names on his prospectuses.

Rengan also introduced evidence to show that when the Panama officials became suspicious and withdrew, Lyman replaced their names with others high in office, without taking the trouble to gain their consent.

### CABINET MEETING HELD TO CONSIDER MEXICAN CRISIS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—President Wilson and Secretary of State Bryan conferred for an hour today concerning the Mexican situation. A cabinet meeting followed. It was the consensus of opinion that important developments are near in Mexico, General Diaz' arrival there promising a speedy crisis.

The president, if he carries out his present plans, will be on his way from Washington to attend the southern commercial congress at Mobile, October 26, the day the Mexican election will be held. He will be in close touch with the capital, however.

Secretary Bryan has cancelled his engagement to accompany the president because of the possibility of sudden happenings in the southern republic.

### ASSERT ADMIRAL EATON DRUG FIEND

PLYMOUTH, Mass., Oct. 21.—Evidence intended to show that Rear Admiral Joseph Giles Eaton was a drug fiend was introduced at the trial today of Mrs. Jennie May Eaton, charged with poisoning the admiral. Mrs. Charlotte Dill was the first witness.

Mrs. Dill testified that Mrs. Eaton told her that the admiral was addicted to the use of drugs and that she was afraid of him. Mrs. Katherine Magoun testified along similar lines.

### GIANTS LOSE GAME TO WHITE SOX, 6-4

PEORIA, Ill., Oct. 21.—The Giants lost today's game with the White Sox here 6 to 4. The batteries for the White Sox were Leverenz and Schalk and Wiltse and Wingo for the Giants.

### EASTERN STAR GRAND CHAPTER AT SANTA CRUZ

SANTA CRUZ, Cal., Oct. 21.—The grand chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star opened here today with Grand Matron Martha G. Dismore presiding. Today's session was devoted to the reading of reports.

### FEARSOME QUIET RULES MEXICO AWAITING DIAZ

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 21.—Quiet reigned here today, but it was the quiet which goes with fear. Trouble was looked for very soon after General Felix Diaz sets foot on Mexican soil.

Diaz did not arrive at Vera Cruz yesterday, as was expected, but was due there this afternoon. His friends said he would come directly to the capital. That he should plan such a move was interpreted as indicating a determination to take the offensive against Provisional President Huerta immediately.

Huerta has hardly shown himself for the last few days and keeps the national palace heavily guarded.

### STANDS OFF OFFICERS WITH BUTCHER KNIVES

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Oct. 21.—Armed with two butcher knives, which he threatens to use on the first person to enter his home, David Vaughn, manager of the Washington Loan & Trust company, and one of the best known pioneers in this city, is harried in his residence today and resisting attempts of officers to dislodge him.

According to Vaughn's physician, he has been in poor health during the past two weeks, and it is thought he is mentally unbalanced. Officers made one rush upon the house this morning, but were repulsed, after which it was decided not to take him by force for fear he would attempt suicide.

The home is being guarded and every attempt is being made to get Vaughn to surrender.

### CHRISTIE SEES BIG FIELD FOR CATHOLICS

BOSTON, Oct. 21.—Addressing the home mission session of the Catholic missionary congress here today, Archbishop Christie of Oregon declared that there were from fifty to sixty million churchless people in America whom Catholicity should reach.

"These people want the truth," Archbishop Christie said, "and it is our duty to carry the truth to them. They will accept it and become an ornament to the great Catholic church in America."

### SUPREME COURT UPHOLDS PORTLAND BONDS FOR DOCKS

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 21.—The legality of the bond issue of \$2,500,000 for the construction or public docks in Portland, and voted by the people some months ago, was upheld by the supreme court today. The court held that it is not necessary for the people of Portland to vote again upon the issuance of bonds, or amend the city charter before the bonds can be authorized. The authority to issue the bonds previously voted by the people rests with the city council, the court decided.

A peremptory writ of mandamus was granted against Mayor Albee and Auditor Harbor of Portland to compel them to sign the issue.

The mayor and auditor had refused to sign the bonds on the ground that the city charter did not delegate to them that authority. The suit was a friendly one, and the outcome will permit the city of Portland to continue the construction of an elaborate system of public docks.

### HOUSE RECESS FOR MONTH ABANDONED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—The attempt to have the house recess for thirty days was abandoned today. Majority Leader Underwood and Minority Leader Mann were unable to agree on the date for an adjournment, according to Underwood's announcement. The house will now formally convene today and immediately adjourn.

Representative Mann thought President Wilson was not justified in believing that the currency bill soon would be passed.

### MANUEL'S BRIDE LEAVES HOSPITAL AS CURED

MUNICH, Oct. 21.—Ex-King Manuel's bride, who has been ill here for some time, was discharged from the hospital today and started with her husband for Signaringen, the residence of her father, Prince William of Hohenzollern. It was announced that the couple will go to England next week.

The developments thus far bear out Manuel's denial of rumors that he was in any way responsible for his wife's condition or that they were about to separate.

### SENATORS AWAY; NO LEGISLATION NOW POSSIBLE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—Adjournment of the senate or the adoption of some plan to force the attendance of absentees was demanded today by Senator Cummins of Iowa. Other senators favored the plan.

"Let's resign, adjourn or resume regular business," said Senator Ashurst. "There is not even a quorum in the city."

"It's a disgraceful confession," said Senator Kern, "to the country that this body is unable to conduct its business because of the absence of members."

### KILLED HIS WIFE "JUST FOR FUN"

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 21.—Hearing that his wife, whom he had shot Saturday night, was dead, Charles E. Haas, 42, attempted to kill himself today in the Globe hotel, using the same weapon with which he had fatally wounded Mrs. Haas. He is in a serious condition. The attempt at self-destruction revealed the hiding place of the man for whom the police had been searching. Mrs. Haas died last evening.

When asked by the officer why he had killed his wife, Haas stated that he did it for fun. This was the reason he also gave for shooting and slightly injuring William Heid, at whose house his wife was staying, and for attempting suicide.

### JUROR GOT DRINK; TRIAL IS IN ORDER

SOUTH BEND, Wash., Oct. 21.—Another trial of the Raymond city officials charged with conspiracy to suborn perjury in a damage suit against the city of Raymond may be necessary because of the filing today of an affidavit by Jess Schull, a bartender, alleging that Charles Beck, one of the jurors, came into the saloon where he worked on October 14 and had a drink. The bailiffs do not know how he broke confinement, if he did.

Of the three men who were on trial, Councilman P. W. Culver was acquitted and City Attorney M. C. Welsh and J. W. Jackson were found guilty.

### FIVE INDICTMENTS BY GRAND JURY; MORE COMING

Five indictments were returned on Tuesday morning by the Jackson county grand jury, which is considering more cases, and will probably vote another batch Wednesday. Those indicted are:

Edward White, hotel swindler, on two counts, one for defrauding Emil Mohr, and one for obtaining money under false pretenses.

Charles E. Stanton, who gaffled steelhead in the Gold Ray dam fish ladder, for killing trout by other means than hook and line.

Henry Morrell, for larceny.

Charles Rose, for obtaining money under false pretenses.

Moses Lifer—burglary at night.

The indicted men will be arraigned Wednesday morning.

### SIXTEEN LOST IN LAKE WRECK

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 21.—Captain A. B. Comins of Port Huron, and sixteen others, comprising the crew of the wooden steamer C. W. Epheke, are believed to have perished when the vessel foundered at 2 o'clock this afternoon in Lake Erie, off Long Point, Ontario. Buffalo agents of the steamer confirmed reports of the wreck. Rescuers have started from Simcoe and Port Colborne.

### BALL PLAYERS FIRM FOR WORLD TOUR

PEORIA, Ill., Oct. 21.—Reports that the New York Giants and the Chicago White Sox planned to abandon their proposed world-wide tour at Vancouver on account of financial losses were characterized as "utterly ridiculous" here today by John J. McGraw, manager of the Giants.

### MRS. IVY HELD TO ANSWER FOR MURDER OF HUSBAND

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 21.—Mrs. Edith Ivy, who recently shot and killed her divorced husband, F. M. Ivy, was held today to answer before the superior court.

## 60 MILE GALE SWEEPS ENTIRE ATLANTIC COAST

Low Districts Flooded and Many  
Vessels Wrecked and Reported in  
Distress—Wires Down and Car  
Service Crippled in Seaboard Cities

Blizzard Rages in Minnesota—Trains  
Delayed and Zero Weather Pre-  
vails—Storm on Great Lakes.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—A sixty-mile gale raged along the Atlantic coast last night and today. Several ships were reported in distress and it was feared there would be wrecks of many small craft. The crew of the schooner Marjorie was brought in by a North German Lloyd boat, which picked them up as their vessel was sinking two hundred miles off shore.

**Baltimore Flooded**  
BALTIMORE, Md., Oct. 21.—A high tide, driven in shore by a sixty-mile gale, flooded the low lying portions of practically every town on the Maryland coast early today. The water in some places was four or five feet deep. Much damage was done on shore and it was feared the losses to coast shipping will prove even heavier.

**Blizzard in Minnesota**  
MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Oct. 21.—One of the earliest really bad blizzards this section has known in years put the street car service seriously out of commission here early today. The temperature was below freezing and the wind approached sixty miles an hour. Trains were considerably delayed.

**SAULT STE MARIE, Mich., Oct. 21.**—The worst storm in years was raging on Lake Superior today. At least eight ships were known to be overdue and it was feared all were lost.

## SUPREME COURT DECIDES FOR GRAY

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 21.—Supreme court handed down the following decisions today:

R. W. Gray, appellant vs. Lottie Pelton, appealed from Jackson county; suit to enforce terms of a contract; reversed. The decision is in favor of Gray, and against Mrs. Pelton.

Carrie P. Mertens vs. Northern State Bank, appellant; appealed from Josephine county; suit to determine adverse claim to real property; affirmed.

Will C. Smith vs. Will G. Smith, appellant, appealed from Josephine county; suit involving title to land; reversed.

Ada Erb Bunch vs. George B. Thomblison, et al, appellants; appealed from Josephine county, suit involving possession of real property, reversed.

### WILLIE HOPPE'S FATHER ACCUSED OF PETTY THEFT

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 21.—A warrant charging burglary was issued here this afternoon for William Hoppe, father of Willie Hoppe, a former prizefighter. The elder Hoppe is accused of stealing \$11 from Carl Goertz.
