Never Discourage Industry

RABER TO HANG ON JANUARY 2

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 21.—With the completion late yesterday of the jury that is to try Jack Drungo, a prizefighter of Chicago, for the murder of Cherry de St. Maurice, a woman of the underworld here, rapid progress was made today by the prosecution and it was expected all the testimony will be in late today or early tomorrow. The witnesses examined late yesterday and at this morning's session of court testified as to Drungo's private life and his association with women of doubtful character. Drungo, who has maintained an air of stolid indifference since his arrest in San Diego, in company with Sam J. Raber, a cafe entertainer, convicted Friday of murder and sentenced today to hang on January 2 at Folsom prison, steadfastly refused to talk and answers all questions in monosyllables. He months his words thickly, and although apparently resenting his companion's confession, in which it was charged that Drungo committed the actual killing, the burly boxer appears to have but a slight conception of the gravity of his crime. Raber almost collapsed today when sentence was pronounced.

SAYS COMPETITION BROUGHT EFFICIENCY

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 21.—That only with the advent of the Home Telephone company—in other words, competition—did the present Bell system in Tacoma reach its actual standard of efficiency, was shown in the testimony given before Constantine J. Smythe, special assistant attorney general appointed to investigate for the government the so-called telephone monopoly in the Pacific northwest, by a number of witnesses today. Those subpoenaed at the concluding session were H. H. Edwards, city clerk; Ray Freeland, commissioner of finance, and several others. In every case the witnesses testified that the Bell system had been exceptionally lax in its service until the independent company entered the field as a competitor. During the existence of the dual system the service had been excellent, while at the present time it is considerably less satisfactory.

LEAH ALEXANDER IS ARRAIGNED FOR MURDER

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 21.—Leah Alexander, the young woman who shot and fatally wounded J. D. Van Buren, a newspaper advertising man, in his office in the Chronicle building here last Saturday, was arraigned before Police Judge Sullivan today, charged with murder. The date of her preliminary hearing will be set October 29, a continuance being granted on the request of the district attorney's office to await the outcome of the coroner's inquest.
