

MERCHANTS FAVOR NEW WATER MAIN AND HEAR SAMUELS

Merchants at their regular meeting at the Medford hotel Monday night adopted a resolution favoring the issuance of \$50,000 bonds for the building of a reserve reservoir and pipe line to protect the city in case of repetition of the break in the water pipe under the Bear creek bridge, which left the city helpless before fire and disease.

After discussion of the merits and demerits of "green stamps" and "catalogues," a committee was ordered appointed to make a report on the question. The merchants decided to continue the \$10 a month subscription to the Pan-Hellenic society rest room for the balance of the year.

On Home Industry I. Samuel, founder and general manager of the Oregon Life Insurance company made a logical talk on the advantage of Medford business men cooperating and rebuilding Medford institutions, and Oregon institutions and thereby keeping Oregon money in Oregon. He urged them to get rid of the parasites who live on the life of the Medford business man and contribute nothing to his prosperity.

Boost for Oregon Mr. Samuel said he hoped every citizen would constitute himself a special committee to talk Oregon first last and all of the time and that whenever the opportunity presented itself to boost for Oregon and the advantages it offers in the way of superior climate, superior products and superior life and health conditions.

LISBON, Oct. 21.—The republican authorities squelched today what the newspaper, El Mundo, asserted was scheduled to be a general uprising of royalists. At the last moment the conspirators evidently lost their nerve, for they turned out only in small numbers for the demonstration they had planned, and these were lured up before many people knew that anything unusual was being attempted.

WILSON NOT ANXIOUS TO SEE SUFFRAGETTE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—If Mrs. Pankhurst sticks to her expressed determination not to visit the white house except upon an invitation she and the president will not meet, it was stated at the executive mansion today. If she calls, however, she will be received. Immigration Commissioner General Caminetti said today that, in granting her an audience, the president could not be construed to have set the seal of his official approval upon militancy.

SULZER'S STORY OF TAMMANY GRAFT STIRS NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Gov. Sulzer's story of "Tammany Boss" Charles F. Murphy's attempt to control his administration at Albany, supplemented last night by the statement from his former special graft investigator, John A. Hennessy, had stirred up fully as much commotion here today as the deposed executive could have possibly wished.

Murphy, indeed, not being in the field for any office, could afford to maintain a dignified attitude refusing to comment on Sulzer's accusations. It was different with Edward McCall, Tammany's nominee for mayor, whom Hennessy named from the platform at Cooper union as a go-between of Murphy in his political deals.

Will Help Mitchell Politicians generally, however said that the bringing of his name into the controversy certainly would be a big help to John Parroy Mitchell, the fusion mayoralty candidate.

Denials were also expected, though they had not yet been issued, from Trustee William E. Paine of the Equitable Life Assurance society who was mentioned by Hennessy as the bearer of Murphy's message to Sulzer that it was "Gaffney or war."

Tammany campaigners in McCall's interest were not relieved, either, by Hennessy's promise to tell more, during the week, of the alleged "alliance between Mc Call and Murphy."

Sulzer Gets Ovation Sulzer, for all of his removal from the governorship and the full substantiation of the charges against him in connection with the impeachment proceedings, developed strength which surprised even his friends.

His friends were convinced that, following his expected election to the assembly, he will be given the speakership and that his return to the executive office will ensue at the next state election.

BEFORE COMMITTING SUICIDE BE SURE TO SEE DR. COPP

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 21.—"Are you contemplating suicide? Don't take the step until you have seen the Rev. Zed Heitzel Copp, Philadelphia." Thus you might read an advertisement of the Rev. Mr. Copp's "mental clinic," if the Presbyterian minister who conceived the idea and is putting it into excellent effect and results, needed to advertise. He doesn't. His work in Philadelphia has advertised itself like it did in Washington, D. C.

"There is hope for the mental prisoner confined in the cell of his own despair. He need not suicide in order to escape the execution of relentless fate. There is always a living way out, if he will only look for it."
