"THE LURE" SERMON FOR PARENTS ON CARE OF DAUGHTERS

"The Lure," a powerful drama, abounding in horror thrills was presented at the Page Theater Tuesday night, and the white slave traffic and green hats exposed and lampooned.

The play is a sermon, against the ignorance of parents. The first act is devoted to bring attention to the lassitude of mothers.

"But white slavery is newspaper talk, that's all," says the mother.

"One thing newspapers can't exaggerate is white slave conditions," replies the secret service agent.

Again in the second act, the slimy cadet telling where he trapped his last victim says: "I met her at a Sunday school social, where everybody has an equal show."

The principal trouble with "The Lure" is that it tells the truth of a great evil so brutally that good people shudder to hear it.

The cast is good. As an educator "The Lure" may some day rank with "Uncle Tom's Cabin."

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 22.—Attempting to show that Dr. J. Grant Lyman, alleged get-rich-quick promoter on trial in the federal court here for using the mails to defraud, had changed the map of the western hemisphere in order to make his land look inviting, M. De Haff, a photographer, was called to the stand today.

The government alleges that Lyman changed the map, cutting off several miles of the west coast of Panama, in order to bring his land to the water's edge.

Letters were read from Panama officials ordering Lyman to remove their names from his literature because of "gross exaggerations."

UTILIZE THE IDLE LAND

THERE are thousands of acres of idle land in the Rogue River valley—much of it adjacent to Medford.

All this land will produce some kind of a crop without water. It will produce some kind of a crop with irrigation. This barren land should be in cultivation.

There has been a revolution both in methods of cultivation, in variety and in yield of grain during the past few years. Land that formerly produced meager yields, under new methods, with suitable varieties of seed now yields in abundance.

Now is the time to utilize this idle land to produce a crop for the coming year. Much of it is virgin and requires only to be plowed and sown.

Idle land, held for speculative purposes, is a curse to the community. It should be taxed so highly that no one could afford to hold it idle.

Farmers can greatly enlarge their yields—if they keep up to date, follow new methods and use seed recommended by experts. The United States government spends millions of dollars a year to find the best varieties to plant and the best systems to utilize—but few of our local farmers take advantage of it.

2000,000 CROWD TO SEE PORTOLA

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 22.—Two hundred thousand visitors arrived in San Francisco during the day to attend the four days of Portola carnival starting today.

METHODIST BISHOPS ANNUAL CONVENTION

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 22.—Twenty-four bishops of the Methodist Episcopal church, representing 17,000 ministers and more than 2,000,000 church members of the United States and foreign countries, met at the Union Methodist church today in annual convention to last five days.

Among the most noted visitors are Bishop Bashford of Pekin, China, former president of Ohio Wesleyan University, who has frequently been called into conference by both sides during the recent Chinese revolution; Bishop Homer C. Stuntz, of Buenos Ayres, who was in the Philippines during the Taft governor-generalship, and Bishop Luther B. Wilson, president of the anti-saloon league.

WHITE SOX OFF WITH GIANTS ON TOUR OF WORLD

The Chicago Tribune of October 18 gives the following concerning the White Sox and Giants, who play here November 17:

The White Sox moved into their special train last night and started on the trip around the world. Although the real getaway will be celebrated here tomorrow night, when both Sox and Giants leave for the west, Comiskey's men began the long tour last night when they set out for Cincinnati, where the first exhibition game with the Giants is to be played today.

With the exception of two or possibly three nights, the athletes will live on that special train for the next thirty-three days. By that time they will have reached Seattle via a circuitous route down through the southwest and up the Pacific coast.

Before leaving last night Comiskey and Callahan had their team for the tour of the world all in line. There is a possibility that two other players will be obtained before the heat sails from America.

The only player they have been after for the last two months wired yesterday that he would make the trip, and both the south side leaders were delighted. That player is Tris Speaker, the star outfielder of the American league, member of the Boston Red Sox. Speaker is expected to join the team either in Cincinnati tomorrow or here on Sunday.

With Speaker and Crawford in the White Sox outfield, Manager Callahan is expected to have the experience at last of seeing his outfielders drive in a lot of runs.

The Sox still are negotiating with Pratt, the star infielder of the St. Louis Browns, and expect to land him in a few days. At present they are fixed for a second baseman, because Joe Berger is going to fill the position until the team reaches California. Someone will have to take his place then for the journey abroad. Hal Chase also will go only as far as the coast, but his place at first base will be taken by Jack Fournier, who will join the boys before they sail.

So far the Sox have only three pitchers for the tour besides "Tex" Russell, who will drop out when the team reach his home, Bonham, Tex. Scott, Benz and Leverenz, the latter from the St. Louis Browns, are the other three. Callahan is likely to sign another American leaguer to take Russell's place.
